Israel Statement from Danny Rich (20.11.2012)

Dear Liberal Judaism constituent member,

Many of you will be aware that last Thursday I signed the British Jewish community letter of support, addressed to His Excellency Daniel Taub, the Ambassador of Israel.

I did so because it was my view that Hamas, the governing party in Gaza – rather than splinter groups- was responsible for the firing of rockets into Israel, that faced with such provocation Israel had a right to decide on a means to protect its citizens, and that Israel's response was targeted at military personnel, potential rocket launch sites, and other institutions of power.

In a community letter – and since it was to be despatched within hours – it was not possible to 'tweak' the letter to suit particular views or express nuances.

Liberal Judaism has in all its statements and efforts always advocated for a solution which offers peace with justice for both Israelis and Palestinians. Further it believes that bellicose statements and force by either or both sides serve the interests of neither Israelis nor Palestinians and is likely to lead to a greater escalation of violence and to further loss of

civilian life.

Israeli spokespersons have declared that 'some 80% or more of long term rockets have been destroyed' and it seems that a ceasefire is now a possibility.

Liberal Judaism urges both parties to operate a ceasefire without preconditions and calls upon all parties involved – including the United Nations, the United States, and the British government – to do all in their power to support a genuine and sustained effort to reach a longer term solution whereby Israelis and Palestinians can live side by side with dignity and security.


Chairman's Word

This year the festival of Chanukah coincides with Human Rights week. As you will see from page 1, our Erev Shabbat service on Friday 14th December will be a Human Rights Shabbat. The exact format of this is still being planned, so if you have any ideas about things we might do, or if you would like to contribute something please email our info address (info@eljic.org).

One of the ideas we have in mind is to highlight the work of the organisation Rene Cassin (see www.renecassin.org). Cassin was a French lawyer and human rights activist. Following the atrocities of the Holocaust, he and Eleanor Roosevelt, wrote the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. You can find the full text of the declaration, along with commentary by Rabbi Mark from a link on the current front page of our web site (www.eljc.org). The organisation Rene Cassin is a human rights NGO that uses the experience of the Jewish people, and positive Jewish values, to campaign and educate on universal human rights issues such as discrimination, detention, and genocide. Their website has several ideas as to what we might be able to do to advance help these rights to be for everyone in the world.

One of the most inspiring sessions I attended at Limmud (see Michael Elam's article on Page 6) was a talk by Steve Miller of Tzedek, a Jewish Organisation to combat extreme poverty. His approach was that of working through education, but not just simply providing educational resources imposed from outside. Instead their work in the poor communities of Northern Ghana involves leadership training starting in the pupils' mother tongue that empowers local teachers to develop educational programs themselves.

This approach reminded me of the Fairtrade approach to helping farmers. If you are planning to buy any chocolate Chanukah Gelt for your families, do try to make it Fairtrade. It is often hard to find this and some of the chocolate coins one can find at this time of year are not only unfair trade but pretty nasty chocolate. Some of the best Fairtrade Chocolate is made by "Divine Chocolate". This firm supports farmers, also in Ghana, and they make both milk and dark chocolate coins. I don't know of any local stockists (let me know if you find any), but one can order them online from several websites and we have some for the kids at the Chanukah Party (see below).



Finally, of course, at this time we are thinking of the human rights of people in Israel and in Palestine to live without the threat of rockets or bombs. As I write this the seemingly fragile cease fire still appears to be holding. Let us hope that this will continue through Chanukah and beyond, and we may even have some progress in the peace process,

Community Matters

Kol Nidre Appeal update

This year our Kol Nidre development charity is Money for Madagascar, and as I have just received their annual newsletter, I thought members might be interested to learn a bit more of how your contributions will help.

A few facts about Madagascar

According to UNICEF, the population of Madagascar is now 20.7 million, nearly 1 million of whom are orphans. The average Malagasy completes just 4.4 years of education, largely due to a lack of classrooms. Over half the children under the age of five suffer from retarded growth, and Madagascar is sixth worst in the world for malnutrition. 57% of the population lives in extreme poverty.

What MfM does to help

Last year, MfM sent over £200,000 to projects in Madagascar. MfM's costs are extremely low (3.5% of their income), since at present much of the work of running the charity is done by volunteers.

Projects include:

- * La Source, a school/training centre for young people with learning disabilities;
- * encouraging enterprise and developing life-skills among vulnerable teenage girls;
- * help for silk farmers in the north east of the country to produce silk, as they can no longer use the protected nature reserve as a source of living;
- * work to protect the vastly-diminished Betampona rain forest through helping local people with safe water, education as to how to grow food in non-destructive ways, and reforestation (which protects their water sources).



LIMMUD VIRGIN

At 09:59 on the morning of Sunday 25th November (2012) I walked through the doors of Holyrood R.C. High on Dixon Rd, Glasgow, for what was to be my very first Limmud! This in fact was I believe Scotland's sixth Limmud Event!

My first Limmud was a painless and joyous experience if not, just a bit over stimulating! There was some concern that maybe some of my desired speakers and their topics that I was keen to go and hear speak might be over subscribed! 'Oh No!' If so, I was prepared as advised to have a second speaker choice to hand. Indeed, many of the talks I attended were packed out! But room was made for more and made for more again and again!

It was great to see so many of the faces that I have got to know and become acquainted with from both east and west of Scotland since I first started attending Sukkat Shalom in July of this year.

The last time I had the company of so many Jews was in Israel in 1993 where I spent my summer as a nineteen year old! There was a coach laid on for us Edinburgh lot, which left from The Salisbury Arms, at the top of Old Dalkeith Rd. The weather on that Sunday morning was thoroughly dreadful! The coach driver was reluctant to let us on before the scheduled 8am departure. The coach driver also insisted that we should not eat food on the coach for the duration of the journey! All of our party including some very young children, turned up to board this coach on a very early and very dark dreich Edinburgh morning. Maybe our coach driver's mood was matching the weather that morning!

One thing that was clear from the topics the speakers spoke about was that the hour was just not long enough! So I felt! Three talks that day that really stand out for me are our very own Sukkat Shalom's Rabbi Mark Solomon's talk 'Equal Marriage The Jewish Way', which was well attended and participated in. Another talk that stands out for me was Glasgow's Reform Rabbi Lisa Barrett's talk 'Listening To G-d 's Voice-An Introduction To Jewish Spiritual Direction'. This can be a strange concept to some but I found listening to Rabbi Lisa's own personal experience and meditative techniques, very invigorating! For Session Six I took in Hagai M. Segal's 'The Arab Spring, Israel And The Middle East'. Segal is fast paced and quick fire, giving the listener a full and complete picture of the current situation on what's news and what's happening and the stuff we don't always get to hear about!

Throughout the day there was a constant supply of coffee/teas and shortbread! Mmhh Mmhh! I took full advantage! Lunch was a simple hearty soup and filled rolls but very nice and very filling.

At the end of the day there was just enough time to take in a bit of Klezmer, Scotland's very own Jewish Folk band. I was very impressed with the band's lead female vocalist's version of Cher's Walking In Memphis!

What thoroughly wonderful day! I'am most certainly looking forward to the next LIMMUD SCOTLAND!!

Then it was time to board the coach home ... with a different driver! And a different attitude! Then it occurred to me that 'I have never been on 'Jewish' coach trip before!

I have now!

Apple-Noodle Kugel

Several people asked who had made the delicious kugel that was brought to our Limmud supper. It was Louise Primrose, and here is her recipe and the story of how she perfected it.

One cup of raisins soaked in a cup of sweet wine or orange liqueur until raisins are plump.

500g of egg noodles

1/4 cup of butter or margarine

8 Granny Smith apples peeled, cored and finely sliced

1/2 cup of light-brown sugar

3/4 cup of apricot jam

3/4 cup of ground almonds

1/2 cup of honey

5 large eggs

Ground cinnamon for dusting.

Heat oven to 350. Grease two 9x12 inch baking trays or combination.

Melt the butter/margarine in pot large enough to hold all the apples, brown sugar, apricot jam and sauté until the apples are soft.

Cook the noodles for no longer than the directions on package and drain, don't over cook.

Remove the apples and mix with the noodles and 2/3 of the raisins drained. Beat the 5 large eggs well, then mix through the noodles and apples. Place the mixed apples, raisins, noodles and egg mixture in to baking trays.

There should be at least half a pot of liquid (add apple juice to the half way mark of the pot) add the remaining raisins and stir in the ground almonds.

Pour the liquid evenly through the noodles and apples. Dust with cinnamon to taste.

Place in middle of oven and turn down to 275 and bake until golden brown and cooked through (approx 35 mins).

Serve with honey, maple syrup etc.

I was once recruited by my kibbutz mother to peel 24 apples for a kugel for the later part of the Shabbat meal, then watched her make a huge kugel, only 19 apples went in the other apples were eaten before it was made. The final bake was truly delicious served with condensed milk (from a white tube with a black patched cow on it); ever since then I've tried to get it right.
