Inscribed in the Book of Life

With other material for the High Holy Days, members of Sukkat Shalom will be receiving a small, pale green booklet modestly entitled Membership Directory and Handbook. The timing is fortuitous, for soon, on Rosh Hashanah, we will be praying as a community, "Remember us for life, Sovereign who delights in life; and write us in the book of life, for Your sake, God of life." Whatever the metaphor of a heavenly book of life might mean, it struck me that our little membership directory is a very human, down to earth book of life – and no less holy for that.

We are a young enough community that our names can fit within the compass of a small booklet; and a close enough community that almost everyone felt happy to have their name listed, most with contact details so that other members can get in touch. Unlike American synagogues, which generally number themselves by households, British Progressive congregations number individual members, so this is a book of individuals – each and every person counts in her or his own right. At the same time, the "other family members" column mentions partners (Jewish or otherwise) and children (nearly forty!), illustrating the open and varied network of relationships that are part of our community life.

The biblical verse that was probably the source of the idea of a divine book of life is Malachi 3:16, "Then those who revered the Eternal One spoke to one another, and a book of record was written before God, of those who revered the Eternal One and honoured God's name." This is a book of communication, allowing us to reach out and speak to one another with friendship and help.

It is a book of life, with a section entitled "From Cradle to Grave" explaining what services the community can offer its members throughout the life cycle. Gillian Raab, in her Chairman's Welcome, writes, "If you find Sukkat Shalom a positive influence in your life ..." and I hope everyone does. It may be in the spiritual nurture of weekly worship, the intellectual stimulation of monthly study, the annual reconnection of Seder and High Holy Days, the Jewish companionship of outings and social events, the pastoral support available in times of need, or the knowledge that Jewish ritual and meaning are available in seasons of joy – birth, coming-of-age and marriage – as well as in seasons of mourning. A positive influence, above all, in reminding us what is truly important in life: the Torah's values of justice, holiness and love of neighbour.

It is a book of hope. I counted, then counted again to be sure it wasn't wishful thinking, and found that the main list contains exactly seventy names – fortuitous again! For it was the seventy souls who went down to Egypt with Jacob (Genesis 46:27, Deuteronomy 10:22) that became the nucleus of a great nation. Even within the finite compass of east Scotland's Jewish community there is the hope and potential for growth, as more and more people are attracted to the traditional teachings and modern approach of Liberal Judaism. As though to indicate this there are a few empty squares at the end of the membership list: plenty of space still to fill up. It's also a tacit acknowledgement of the few members who chose not to have their names publicised, and the proselytes who attend regularly in their preparation for conversion, and who will surely appear as members in the next edition.

It is a book of encouragement. The rise in numbers since the last membership directory should encourage us that we are travelling in the right direction. More importantly, the booklet suggests several ways members can get more involved and active. The Hebrew word for a year – shanah – can be linked to the verb "repeat" (shanah), because each year follows the same cycle as the last, but also to the verb "change" (shinnah) because a new Jewish year challenges us, through the moving and inspiring services of the Days of Awe, to move forward ethically, grow spiritually, and step up our commitment to Jewish life and values.

Just as the booklet was going to press, a discussion sprang up about the range of communal

organisations listed, some feeling that this ought to have included groups dealing with Israel and the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. It is no secret that our community, like many, contains a spectrum of views on this most contentious of contemporary Jewish issues. In the end it was too late to resolve the question and get the booklet out on time, but over the coming year we will certainly have to continue our dialogue on how we, as Liberal Jews in Scotland, can best express our commitment both to universal equal rights for all human beings – including the right to dignity and self-determination – and to the survival, safety and thriving of the Jewish people in Israel and elsewhere.

One thing our modest directory cannot assure, unlike the metaphorical heavenly book of life, is the fate of those inscribed in it for the coming year. For that, our Machzor (prayer book) tells us, we must resort to "penitence, prayer and charity." My prayer is that all of you and your loved ones may be blessed with a year of life and health, prosperity and happiness. Le-shanah tovah tikatevu ve-techatemu – may we all be written and sealed for a good year.

Chairman's word

We are grateful to the kind words our Rabbi has expressed about our membership directory. Indeed, it was not a small task to produce it and it was thanks to Eva Wiseman, our membership secretary's persistence that we were able to get responses from so many of you. But, as many of you noticed it does have a fatal flaw. The last two digits of people's home telephone numbers were cut off by the process of making the link to our data base. I'm not sure how this fault feeds in to Mark's analogy. Does the book of life ever suffer from misprints? But our embarrassment has certainly encouraged us to get the correction sheet in the mail. So if you do not receive yours in the next few days do please conatact us. And be sure to staple it in to the back of your directory so it does not get lost.

The question of Human Rights, and particularly competing rights is something I have been very aware of in the last few days. I was alerted, by Leah Granat of ScoJec to a consultation by the Equalities and Human Rights Commission (EHRC) in connection with some cases which are shortly to be heard by the European Court of Human Rights. These cases all involve situations where the religious rights are at odds with other rights. One such case was that of Lilian Ladele, the Islington registrar who was dismissed from her post for refusing to officiate at civil partnerships. The EHRC are planning to prepare a case which argues that religious rights are less well protected than other rights, for example, the rights of disabled people. In both cases the arguement hinges on what can be regarded as "reasonable accommodation" to ensure that a person's rights are met. Full details of the consultation can be found on the consultation page of the ScoJec web site (www.ScoJec.org). There was no agreement among community repsentatives who responded to ScoJec and as a result ScoJec will not respond to EHRC. I am pleased at this as it seems to me that it may be inappropriate for EHRC to circulate religious bodies to strengthen their case, But I am sure others would disagree with me.

Human Rights Day is coming up in early December an we are planning a Human Rights Shabbat. A few of us will be forming a group to discuss what we will do. Please be in touch if you would like to join us. One conflict of rights that we all must be acutely aware of is that of Jews and Arabs rights in Israel/Palestine. I hope that we might be able to take this on board from a human rights perspective, as Mark has suggested above.

On a happier note, musicians have often been in the forefront of resolving conflicts. One fine example is the work that Valery Gergiev, now Honorary President of the Edinburgh International Festival, has



carried out in the Caucuses. I was fortunate last week to attend a concert by a group of musicians from the Philadelphia Orchestra led by the cellist Udi Bar-Davd. Udi runs an organisation that brings together people in times of conflict through music. You can read about it and listen to music from different traditions on www.interculturaljourneys.org.
