Chairman's Last Word...

... not literally (as far as I know), but the last one as chair. I'm standing down at next week's AGM, as required by a far-seeing constitution, and beginning a new life as A Face in The Crowd (I'm still waiting for the result of my application for a new identity under the Witness Protection Programme).

I gave a summary of my time in the chair in my annual report (part of the AGM mailing). Trying to write a summary of the summary, my first thought was of Vinnie Jones's farewell in *Lock, Stock and Two Smoking Barrels*: "it's been ... emotional". Mostly in a good way, of course!

Here's a slightly longer version of the same thought: when we were thinking of starting the community I wrote "if we want to, we can decide to build a community with a spiritual centre, a conscience, and a sense of belonging and communal support". For a lot of our everyday work that's a very pompous description. But although we haven't fully achieved the community I was thinking of, I do feel we have been working towards it, and that we're headed in the right direction. Not there yet? As ever, Rabbi Tarfon has the last word: "It is not for you to complete the task, but neither are you free to desist from it". Which brings me to...

Sukkat Shalom Facilitated Discussion on Israel

I reported last month that we have secured the professional help of our members Stew Green and Sue Lieberman to facilitate a discussion on Israel. The council knows what a difficult topic this is, but we felt that for us as a community to be unable to express our feelings to one another would be more dangerous still.

So, without any intention of trying to reach a common position, we have to try to talk—cautiously, with the greatest regard for one another's feelings, and with the interests of our community always foremost in our minds. There will be no Sukkat Shalom "position on Israel", but we need to know that our community is a safe, respectful, Jewish environment where we can discuss the issues and share our perspectives.

Blessed is the Match The Life and Death of Hannah Senesh

Director: Roberta Grossman

USA 2008 85 mins Language: English

Hannah Senesh was just 22 when she parachuted into Nazi-occupied Europe with a small band of Jewish volunteers from Palestine: the only military rescue mission for Jews during the Holocaust. A gifted student from a wealthy Budapest family, Hannah became a committed Zionist in the face of growing anti-Semitism in Hungary, emigrating to Palestine in 1939 without her beloved mother Catherine. Hannah's mission ended in tragedy when she was captured and executed in a Gestapo prison, yet her poetry and diaries have left an inspirational legacy.

Roberta Grossman's film tells Hannah's story as much through the eyes of Catherine Senesh as those of the heroine herself, bringing their letters and diaries to life with gripping reconstructions to explain how their bond, as well as Hannah's love for her people, compelled this courageous idealist to return to Hungary from the safety of her kibbutz. Narrated by Oscar-nominated actress Joan Allen, and featuring interviews with Hannah's fellow female parachutists and former Israeli president Shimon Peres, Blessed is the Match is an unmissable testament to a 20th century Joan of Arc.

A charming and deeply moving comicdrama about a young Israeli woman and an abandoned Chinese boy whose lives converge in the most surprising manner. Miri, a thirty-something flight attendant who has been twice widowed, lives with her volatile sister Gila, who is in the throes of a mid-life crisis. Returning home from work one day Miri thinks nothing of being asked to look after their Chinese maid's young son. But when she fails to return Miri finds herself with a six year old Chinese boy silently waiting for his mother to come back. Thus begins a remarkable journey involving family, friends and an array of engaging characters, crossing continents and cultures in an attempt to reunite mother and child.

Flawless script, witty dialogue and well crafted visuals are all spiced up with a sensitive insight into human lives and loves, turning this film into a meaningful cinematic experience.

Claire Ungerson on The rescue of Jewish men from Greater Germany in 1939: the case of the Kitchener Camp in East Kent.

Clare Ungerson is an Emeritus Professor of Social Policy. Since her retirement from the University of Southampton in 2004 she has moved away from Social Policy research and begun a study of a refugee camp for Jewish men which existed in East Kent in 1939/40. Known as the Kitchener or Richborough Camp, it was funded and organised by the Anglo-Jewish great and good. Given that 4000 men were saved and that she has found some fascinating archive material, it is surprising that so little has been published about the camp. This talk uses visual material, diaries, memoirs and interviews, to illustrate some important issues - why was the camp only for men, how were the men selected, and why was the British government willing to waive the usual visa requirements to allow these refugees into the UK.



How to Make a Life-changing Ethical Commitment

A committed connection to Israel can take many forms. I have wondered in the last two months more than ever what it must be really like to be Israeli, and how I can support Israel to become the place I want it to be. On Thursday 12th March we get a chance to find out what it means to put Jewish ethics on the line. Tamar Katz, from the Israeli Shministim (translates as S6 school leavers), will be speaking in Edinburgh that day.

The issue of military refusal in Israel has been brought to the fore by the Gaza conflict. The graphic reports of the deaths and injuries that it caused have resulted in many anguished discussions, often weighing the tactics used by each side against the other. For me, Hamas tactics don't affect the moral challenge posed by Israeli actions, and my personal hope for the meeting of March 29th is that we will see our community taking that moral challenge seriously. The challenge an Israeli teenager faces, however, is of a completely different order, with infinitely more serious consequences flowing from their decision. When, months ago, Tamar Katz had to decide on her future, she made a big decision:

"I refuse to enlist in the Israeli military on conscientious grounds. I am not willing to become part of an occupying army, that has been an invader of foreign lands for decades, which perpetuates a racist regime of robbery in these lands, tyrannizes civilians and makes life difficult for millions under a false pretext of security."

Only 19, Tamar has served three prison sentences for living up to her ethical commitment. Israeli school leavers face a huge burden of ethical responsibility:

"I oppose the anti-Palestinian policy of attrition and the oppression, not because I prefer the Palestinian society to the Israeli one, but out of an understanding that this

policy has led us down a dead-end road politically and to immorality, forced especially on soldiers stationed in the Occupied Territories. I am not willing to become one of those holding the gun pointed indiscriminately at Palestinian civilians, and I do not believe that such actions could bring any change except ever more antagonism and violence in our region."

Liberal Judaism takes a strong position on social justice. The following is taken from LJ's statement on social action (http://liberaljudaism.org/tikkun_2.htm):

"Prophets like Amos and Isaiah cried out against those who would place ritual over ethics, who would mouth fine words but fail to fulfil moral duties. Their words inspired our Liberal Jewish founders and have shaped our movement throughout its history. If we are to remain true to this precious legacy, social action must not be left to languish on the periphery of synagogue life. Fine words from our rabbis won't be enough to bring it back to the centre; neither will stirring editorials in synagogue newsletters."

Israel and Palestine will take generations to heal. We owe our support to young Israelis and Palestinians not to burden them with the sins of their and our ancestors, but to strengthen them. I encourage you to give Tamar and the other Shministim your support, and go and hear her speak. And go to the website of the Shministim (http://december18th.org/) and sign their petition against the imprisonment of teenage refusers.

Our Crowd

This month "Our Crowd" features our dedicated and talented newsletter editor, Kristi Long.

Q: What is your favourite Jewish holiday?

A: My favourite Jewish holiday is Rosh Hashanah. I chose this holiday among all others because: There are many different elements that I find appealing and meaningful. There's the excitement and anticipation of a new year. (I've always felt that the autumn was the real 'new year', not January 1st, possibly because I spent so many years in academia or in jobs closely tied to academia.) I love the traditional Rosh Hashanah liturgy, particularly Avienu Malkenu, the traditional Vidui and the traditional Unetanneh Tokef. I came to Judaism via the Conservative Movement, and miss some of the traditional elements of the liturgy that aren't included in the Liberal service. I also love the tradition of eating round foods, and doing Tashlich. To someone from a Protestant background, Rosh Hashanah is so unbelievably rich and multifaceted in terms of theology, liturgy and ritual practice. For me it exemplifies many things that I love about Judaism.

Q: What is your favourite Jewish food?

A: My favourite Jewish food is very hard to say. Probably bagels, which I dearly miss. Latkes run a close second, though.

Q: What is your favourite Jewish memory?

A: My immersion in the mikvah.

Q: What do you like best about our ELJC community?

A: Its participatory nature and do it yourself approach.

Q: Tell us a secret about you.

A: My father became a minister when I was 13, and my mother many years later when I was a graduate student. When I was a teenager, I hated being the preacher's kid. But I remember reading my father's comparative religion books when he was in seminary and being fascinated by different religions.

Q: Do you have any favourite Jewish songs?

A: Well, that depends on how you define a 'Jewish song'! Is it a song written or performed by Jews, or a song with some sort of 'Jewish content'? And, other than clearly liturgical or folk music, how would we define 'Jewish content'? Taking a broad approach to the notion of a 'Jewish song' I'll go out on a limb with 'I Want to Be Sedated' by the Ramones or Brave Combo's 'Hava Nagila Twist'. In terms of more recognizably Jewish songs, I'd go for 'Shalom Aleichem', which is probably my favourite liturgical song.

Q: What are your favourite Jewish composers, artists, entertainers or authors?

A: Among authors I would include Bruno Schultz, who wrote really magical short stories, and David Grossman, who's also clearly influenced by Schultz. I also really like Nathan Englander, Jonathan Safan Foer and some of Michael Chabon's work. I vividly remember reading Chaim Potok's The Chosen when I was young and being utterly enthralled with it. In non-fiction, I'd say Avivah Zornberg, Neil Gilman, and Claude Levi-Strauss. Favourite entertainers would have to be the Marx Brothers. I really like lots of early Woody Allen films. I like Marc Chagall's painting.

Q: If you could have dinner with some Jewish celebrities, whom would you invite?

A: If I limit myself to living people, then how about Claude Levi-Strauss (legendary anthropologist), Neil Gaiman (creator of the Sandman comics), Woody Allen, David Grossman (novelist), James Callis (actor), Adam Michnik (political thinker and opposition leader in Poland and a real hero of mine)

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and Avivah Zornberg (brilliant commentator on the Bible). That's a selection of people that should be able to have an interesting conversation about literature, theory, theology and pop culture.

Q: What are your favourite travel destinations?

A: New York, but that's like going home. It used to be Edinburgh until I moved here. I haven't traveled much in recent years but I'd like to go to Prague and Budapest, and to Paris

Q: How would you describe your personal journey to Judaism?

A: My personal journey to Judaism may best be described as an unexpected trip to a new but strangely familiar place. It was part of a larger process of shifting to an entirely new culture. It's interesting how much graduate school prepares you for becoming Jewish! I've always been fascinated by the concept of the pilpul (the Jewish soul born into a Gentile body) because I feel much more at home in Judaism than I ever felt as a Methodist.
