Word from the Chair

This month, I'm going to return to a topic I've mentioned before, and it's very much about me in as much as I have said ever since I became Chair that I was going to stand for three years. My three-year stint will come to an end at the next AGM in early 2020, at which point we will need to elect a new Chair.

The election of a new Chair is always something of a doubleedged sword in the sense that it always feels like it is the right



thing to have someone 'lined up' to take over, but in so doing we are always open to the charge that 'the whole thing is a stitch-up'. Furthermore, since the new Chair is often someone who has been previously involved, it could be said that the 'stitch-up' is the old guard continuing to run our community. I don't really want to debate the merits of this, other than to say that it feels highly probable that anyone who stands for election as Chair is likely to have been involved with the community in one way or another. In that sense you can't have it both ways; if you want someone with some experience of the community as Chair, they will by definition already have been involved.

However, as I say, I don't want to discuss the merits of how we elect our Chair other than to confirm that at the next AGM we will be looking to appoint a new Chair and at the moment neither I nor the Council are aware that anyone intends to stand for the position. That being the case, there are three points I would like to make.

The first is to note that any member can stand for election as Chair. Following on from my comments above, it has always been the case that previous nominees have had some experience of the running of our community, but as with any position you are looking to fill, you can draw up a list of criteria for the ideal candidate. And pretty much every time, the candidate appointed has some but not all of the qualities. I would suggest that is certainly the case for the current Chair, and – no offence intended Maurice, Gillian & Norman – has been the case for all those who have been Chair of our community. So, if you have ever considered becoming Chair, or indeed becoming more involved in the general running of the shul – we elect Council members at the AGM too – maybe now is the time to consider it. We are a hardworking and enthusiastic group of people, and while I'd be fibbing if I didn't say that sometimes I think we can all feel that it does involve a reasonable amount of work, we do it for the love of our community and of Judaism. For me the personal satisfaction I get when I think that I have been instrumental in the running of our community is the reward.

The second point to make is that we as the Council, both collectively and individually, will continue to see if we can identify anyone who would like to become Chair. Or indeed co-Chair; our constitution currently identifies the position of Chair, but that's not to say that it can't be changed and I for one would be very much in favour of such a change if we did have members who were willing to be co-Chairs.

The last point to make is that, given that we are not aware that anyone is going to stand for Chair at the next AGM, we have started discussing options for what we will do if no-one does indeed stand. Our preferred option at this stage is that we will allocate the various duties of the Chair between Council members. It is certainly the case that there wouldn't be a 'nominated figurehead' as there is with the Chair, but there are advantages in 'spreading the load' and I know that everyone who is on Council will pull together and do their bit.

If you would like to know any more about the duties of the Chair, being a Council member, or indeed any of the other aspects of running our community, I'd be happy to discuss them with you.

New Year, New Learning

Each New Year holds the excitement of new learning, and of particular relevance to those of us living in small and far-flung communities are the new live, interactive on-line courses offered by Leo Baeck College's adult Jewish learning programme, the Lehrhaus. Having participated in two such courses in the last six months, I can vouch for the quality of the content and the technology. The experience approximates as far as is possible an interactive physical seminar. Numbers are kept low (so if you're interested, book now); the technology, using the Zoom platform, is more or less seamless, and thought has been put into how to adapt teaching methods to this medium.

All sessions will be recorded and available to students for seven days after each session. Book early – spaces are limited.

Course Description:

During the month of Elul, we will prepare ourselves for the Grand Rendezvous with ourselves and the Divine that are the High Holy Days. This class is based on the reading of some High Holy Days prayers, such as U'netane Tokef, Vidui, and Al Cheyt, and some reflective passages from our tradition. Most importantly, it is the contributions of the students of this Torah that will increase our readiness. We will discuss remembrance, renewal, teshuva, forgiveness, and we will attempt to map our soul two days before Rosh Hashanah to get ready for a new year, a year of blessings and fulfillment, a year of strength and resilience, and a year of growth.
