Synopsis

In recent years a number of obvious incidents have seemed to demonstrate a relationship of hostility between the World of Islam and the

Chairman's word

I am delighted that my few words this month appear on the same page as the report about our cheder. Nothing has given me more pleasure than to see how this has grown over the few years since we started. We have always had terrific teachers, starting with Rachel Savage and with contributions from many others including dedicated parents. Other members and of course our supporting rabbis have given invaluable support to prepare young people for Bar and Bat Mitzvahs. But it was not until we started having classes in a more formal setting, though still a friendly one, that cheder has really come to life.

A Cheder Challenge grant from Leo Baeck College was the motivation for us to seek premises to hold the cheder rather than meeting in people's homes. The money from the grant helped us to directly. But what helped us even more was the opportunity that applying for the grant gave us to set ourselves goals and to articulate our aspirations. Thanks to everyone who has helped to make this happen - parents, teachers, children and the staff at Marchmont St Giles for making us so welcome.

Sukkat Shalom Cheder

We are delighted that our cheder has grown substantially recently and we now have 14 children aged 4 to 11 enrolled and participating. Classes are held in the very attractive premises of Marchmont St Giles Church Centre fortnightly from 3.30 to 5.30pm on a Shabbat afternoon.

We are extremely fortunate in having a wonderful team of dedicated teachers. The cheder teaching is coordinated by Norman Crane, who has had extensive experience of cheder teaching in his previous shul in Manchester and who also takes occasional sessions. Nancy Lynner, who has taught Jewish pre-school in the USA, takes class Aleph; Lauren Fox, who many of you will know from her contributions to Sukkat Shalom, takes class Bet (7-9 year olds) and Saul Aryeh Kohn, a student of astrophysics who has taught cheder at Kingston Liberal Shul, takes class Gimmel (10-12 year olds).

The three classes run simultaneously with a break for snack in the middle. Snack is organised by a rota of parents. During the winter months each session finishes with a Havdalah ceremony led by Lauren in which the whole cheder participates together with parents.

Class Aleph (4-6 years old) do a variety of activities within the two blocks of time. The first block includes activities about Hebrew and the Aleph Bet. These activities include manipulating playdoh into the shapes of the letters, writing in worksheets, playing letter-match games and sounding out and comparing letters. One new letter is practised each week - sometimes two. And this is just before snack! After snack the class reads books together, acts out stories. dances, sing songs and plays games and rhythm instruments. Every class is a special and unique experience. Ask any of the students and you will find that the don't want to miss one. They thrive on being together and learning the building blocks of Hebrew and Jewish stories.

Class Bet (7-9) is continuing to learn all the Hebrew letters using the textbook Z'man Likro (Time to Read) with the games and activities that go with it and associated written work. The objective is to go on to an introductory text book to the Prayer Book and on to the Siddur itself. The class is currently involved in an ongoing project which looks at those values you might need to build a Jewish community from scratch.

Class Gimmel (10 - 12) is reading Hebrew from the Chumash concentrating on stories from the Book of Genesis which involve the Patriarchs and Matriarchs. The stories are also used to draw out ethical values. This usually done by involving the students in activities. For example, the story of Jacob and Esau led the students to cooperate in building a structure using newspaper. This contrasts with Jacob and Esau who failed to cooperate. The class is also to become familiar with the structure of the Chumash and the idea of the weekly Parashah and the division into chapters and verses.

Jacob's Pottage

Looking at Genesis XXV the other way round, Jacob buys Esau's birthright for a mess of pottage. How dumb is that?! Should have sold him the recipe instead (intellectual property). Here it is (serves 4 – Jacob, Esau, Isaac and Rebekah):

8 oz. red lentils, washed
6 oz. onion, finely chopped
3 oz. carrots, finely chopped
6 cloves garlic, finely chopped
1 inch root ginger, finely chopped
8 chillies (optional, if using chilli powder)
½ tsp. chilli powder (or more, if you like)
1 teaspoon cumin seed
2 pints water
juice of 1 lemon
1 tbsp. vegetable oil
black pepper to taste

Boil water in large saucepan. Add the lentils, half the chillies (or chilli powder), half the ginger, black pepper. Bring back to boil and simmer for 1 hour. In a pan, fry the onion, carrot, garlic, and the rest of the ginger until golden. Add cumin, chilli powder (or rest of chillies), fry 3 minutes. Add to lentil pot and simmer 15 minutes. Add lemon juice.

This is good served with a dollop of yoghurt, chopped flat-leaf parsley and a sprinking of the following seed mixture:

50 g. sunflower seeds ½ tsp. fennel seeds 1 tsp. caster sugar pinch of salt

Dry-fry in non-stick pan over high heat, stirring with spatula for 3 or 4 minutes until sunflower seeds start to take colour and the sugar is liquefied. Remove from heat, stir to break up clusters, let cool.

Class Aleph contributes to Blue Peter 'Send a Smile' Project

Operation Smile is a charity that provides free surgeries to repair cleft lip, cleft palate and other facial deformities for children around the globe. More than 200,000 children are born with a severe cleft condition each year — often unable to eat, speak, socialize or smile. In some places these children are shunned and rejected. A 45 minute operation can change their lives. Before mitzvah day cheder class Aleph (4-6 year olds) made gowns which have now been dispatched to the charity. These gowns originated as tee shirts, which the children and teachers adapted, according to Blue Peter's suggestions.


Today's mission: clear gorse! Although gorse is a lovely blooming bush (and, in the spring, smells like coconut), it tends to crowd out other plants. It's also highly flammable, and an overgrown stand of course was posing a fire hazard to some young trees, as well as choking them out. Our goal was to build a firebreak between the gorse and the trees. Seven of our members, guided by Historic Scotland Rangers Adam and Stuart, learned to cut down gorse with saws and 'loppers', while avoiding – for the most part—the sharp thorns. At the end of the day, we'd cleared a substantial firebreak and liberated at least 10 young trees that had been hidden in the overgrown gorse. Adults and young people all agreed that it was fun and satisfying – so much that we are already making plans to go back in three months.

Holyrood Park is a real jewel, a wonderful place for both people and wildlife. We were proud to have contributed a bit to the upkeep of this park, which has meant so much to so many people.

JFS Case

Writing about the JFS appeal case in the Guardian, Rabbi Danny Rich, Chief Executive of Liberal Judaism, said, "The Jewish community of Britain has frequently made history, and its appearance in the first ever case in Britain's new Supreme Court is a further, albeit hardly auspicious, example." The case is currently being heard in the Supreme Court.

Is being a Jew a matter of bloodline or religious practice? Should parents have to "prove" an adequate level of religious observance to get their children into a Jewish school, or should it be decided by matrilineal descent? Liberal Judaism and the Liberal Synagogue Elstree and Rabbi Pete Tobias featured on Newsnight and BBC Radio 2 in programmes looking at the issue of Jewish identity.

Rabbi Dr Sidney Brichto Publications Fund Plans for new Haggadah

Liberal Judaism is delighted to announce the establishment of a new publications fund, set up in memory of Rabbi Dr Sidney Brichto z''l, the first ever Executive Director of the Union of Liberal and Reform Synagogues (now Liberal Judaism). The fund's first project will be Liberal Judaism's new haggadah (scheduled for publication in February 2010) and donations are invited for this purpose. Donations received before the end of January will be marked by a dedication in the haggadah's frontispiece. Any profits from the sale of the haggadah will be ploughed back into the fund to provide for future publications.

SCoJeC

The Scottish Council of Jewish Communities (SCoJeC) is the representative body of all the Jewish communities in Scotland. In furtherance of that end, it represents the Jewish community in Scotland to government and other statutory and official bodies, monitors the Scottish Parliament and liaises with MSPs and others on matters affecting the Jewish community. Copies of their newsletter (Four Corners) are available at our services.

A delegation from SCoJeC met the First Minister for a private meeting at his official residence, Bute House in Edinburgh. The initial reason for the meeting was the increase in antisemitic activity during the past year, and the First Minister expressed his horror at the abuse of the name of the SNP in extreme antisemitic graffiti at a Jewish cemetery, which he described as "deranged", and instructed his staff to ensure that the local authority concerned takes prompt and effective action in the event of a recurrence.

Mr Salmond was also very perturbed to learn of the increase in the number and range of antisemitic incidents, and pledged his support for strategies of both education to help prevent this, and prosecution to help deter it. In particular, the First Minister said he was pleased to hear of the recent prosecution of someone accused of posting vicious antisemitic messages on a newspaper website, and undertook to write to editors to remind them of their responsibility for what appears on their sites.
