Chairman's Word

It's quite a coincidence that this year Pesach supposedly a festival entirely on the theme of slavery and liberation—should fall this year just at the time that the same subject is so much in the news, with the celebration of the 200th anniversary of the abolition of the slave trade. One idea that I'm only now absorbing from this coverage is the extent to which the economic foundations of this country were laid by the slave trade.

I had always absent-mindedly attributed Britain's domination of the nineteenth century to the fact that English people are good with boats, and I had managed to overlook what those boats were carrying—human bodies, being treated as perishable goods. That's what gave Britain its huge lead in the Industrial Revolution—something worth remembering when development aid is discussed as a kind of charity. It would make more sense to think of development aid as reparations!

I finally made the connection when the Make Poverty History campaign (remember that? it's still alive!) sent me some resources to put on the MPHJC website. These are to help to connect slavery and Pesach, and you can find some stimulating and challenging ideas in them (www.eljc.org/mph). I know Rabbi Pete is thinking about how to include some of them in our communal Seder on Monday night. But it's not just up to the man leading the Seder—as the Liberal Judaism leaflet tells us:

When Jews retell the Pesach story, the point is to remind us that the same God that made possible the Exodus makes it possible at this very moment for the world to be transformed and liberated from all forms of oppression. So don't just read about the past, let your Seder table be filled with ideas, debate, and visions of what could be and what you personally will do to make it happen.

What a great event the Seder is! When else do we get the opportunity to enjoy each others' company, to have a good meal, to experience the pleasure of reliving tradition, to fully sense the privileges and freedoms we have inherited, *and* to be challenged to repair the damage to the freedom of others that, directly or indirectly, we are accomplices to. It's got everything let's make the most of it!

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Sun-dried Tomato Sauce with Fair Trade Pasta

Serves four

Inaredients

75g/3oz onion, chopped 75g/3oz carrot, chopped 75g/3oz celery, chopped 125g/4oz drained sun-dried tomatoes 1 tbsp oil from the tomatoes 1 tbsp butter or margarine 2 cloves of garlic, crushed 1 can chopped tomatoes 1 small glass dry white wine Salt & Pepper 175g fairtrade pasta

Method

1. Chop the sun-dried tomatoes 2. Heat the oil and butter together in a large pan. Add the vegetables and garlic and cook for 10 minutes or so, stirring all the time until they begin to soften.

3. Stir in the canned tomatoes, wine and seasoning. Cover and simmer for a further 30 minutes. Stir occasionally

4. Blend about half the sauce until smooth using a food processor or blender. Add this to the rest of the sauce and serve over the pasta with the cheese and, if you are feeling very wicked, a spoonful of creme fraiche or, better still, mascarpone, the Italian double cream fresh cheese which can be found in most supermarkets.
