REPORTS

Liberal Judaism visit - preliminary report

On Friday 30th and Saturday 31st July, we welcomed members from Liberal Judaism (LJ) to our erev shabbat and shabbat services. On erev shabbat, the service was taken by Rabbi Aaron Goldstein, the LJ Outreach Director. Rabbi Aaron introduced it as a 'different' service and I think the style can be best described by the words reflective and inclusive. Rather than just recite the prayers, we were invited to stop and think about their meaning at various points in the service. Together with the guitar music, it made for a very nice service and one that did indeed make you think. Both the erev shabbat service and the shabbat service the following morning used the Liberal Judaism prayer book 'Lev Chadash'

The shabbat morning service was lead by Rabbi Mark Goldsmith, who is the chairman of the LJ Rabbinic conference, and was introduced as a more traditional Liberal service. I think it's fair to say that both the erev shabbat and shabbat services were familiar to us in their general format. While some of the readings were different, the central parts of the service were the same. We all coped very well with the gender-neutral language and the use of the matriarchs as well as the patriarchs in the amidah!

After both services, we had a discussion session. On Friday night this was led by Rabbi Aaron, covering some of the religious/doctrinal aspects of LJ. On Saturday the discussion was led by Nigel Cole, the LJ vice-chairman, and covered some of the more practical aspects of affiliation. While a full write-up of the discussions will be posted on the website, the thing that really struck me was that in terms of the difference bertween Liberal and Reform Judaism, what was said at the RSGB meeting was repeated at these discussions, namely that Reform Judaism is more pragmatic while Liberal is more principled. In terms of doctrine, Liberal Judaism accepts patrilinearity whereas Reform doesn't, and while same-sex and mixed faith blessings are more likely to be given by Liberal congregations, it was clear that this is very much an individual choice by both rabbis and congregations.

To conclude, let me mention the core issue - food. The shabbat lunch was one of the best, if not the best, that we've ever done. If the quality of our food is a sign that we are progressing as a community, then I'm sure both the Reform and Liberal movements would be glad for us to affiliate with them!

Steering Group

We have a slow month for activities in August, to allow us to rest up in preparation for September (the Siyyum, the General Meeting, and the High Holy Days, closely followed by Succot and Simchat Torah) Much of the work of the Steering Group will come to a focus and conclusion this month, as the group will be wound up at the General Meeting on September 12th, to be replaced by an elected community council. Important questions still need to be resolved as part of that change, and the September 12th meeting will decide most of them: our **affiliation**, the final form of our **constitution**, the **English name** of our community, **subscription** levels, our preferred choice of **burial ground**, and our chosen officers.

The steering group wants to ensure that everyone is sufficiently prepared for these decisions. Members should have already received a copy of the constitution; please look at it carefully and decide whether you want to make any written contribution to the discussion by August 27th. On affiliation, the affiliation group is currently writing a full report on the two meetings that we have had with the synagogue federations, and this report will be on the website soon and circulated to all members. On the question of the burial ground, it seems we are likely to have a choice between the Dean cemetery and Corstorphine Hill. We consider ourselves very fortunate to have such a choice; either would be very acceptable. Within the next few days I will put a description with photographs of each on to the website, but if you would like to see the proposed sections of the two cemeteries for yourself, please contact Gordon (07767 343248 or gordon@barclaygoring.fsnet.co.uk who will arrange a guided tour if there is any interest).

REPORTS (continued)

Security Update

Now that we are fully-fledged independent community, Gordon, who is security co-ordinator, has been upgrading our contacts with the Manchester office of the Community Security Trust (CST) and with the Community Safety Branch of Lothian and Borders Police. Both organisations have been very helpful, providing realistic advice for our situation (living in a very safe city, but needing to be sensibly vigilant); as a result we have amended some of our policies: for example, on making venue information available on the website to people who have not made prior contact. The Police have been particularly helpful in advising on security and ticketing arrangements for the siyyum. CST are offering free training.

One new feature we have recently introduced is a 'security phone' which will be held by whoever is on security duty at a venue, and can be used for latecomers to alert security staff — please don't abuse this! The number is 0789 143 9646. Fortunately, there is little anti-Semitic activity in Edinburgh, although there has been an isolated incident of graffiti in north Edinburgh. The Police and Council have a policy of removing racist graffiti immediately; therefore, if you see anything of this kind, report it (via Gordon if you prefer, on 07767 343248 or by e-mail gordon@barclaygoring.fsnet.co.uk).

Gordon would like to hear from fellow-members who would be willing to take a turn doing security duty.

Siyyum

Work is proceeding on the organisation for the *siyyum* on 5 September. Tickets are going quickly, with two MSPs signed up by mid-July!

There is no set order for a *siyyum* so Rebekah is designing a service to suit our needs; one necessary feature is the blowing of the *shofar*. We also intend to have the scroll passed through the hands of every member of the community after it is piped into the venue. The scroll will be 'completed' as part of the ceremony.

The repair work on the scroll has finished – it will arrive with the scribe late on 4 September, before the service. The scribe, Marc, will be giving the D'var Torah. Marc writes:

"This has probably been my biggest and most time consuming repair job to date but very worthwhile and you have a really lovely light, manageable torah (I am working on one at the moment I can barely lift! and actually have another that is absolutely packed with errors to follow on) written by one scribe (though at some points his writing does get a bit bigger, which I originally mistook for a different hand) which is rare for a second hand torah, in very nice legible writing for a scroll so small and light. I am certainly very happy to have been able to restore this one for congregational use and I'm very grateful to you and your congregation for another chance to perform the 613th commandment."

Edinburgh International Book Festival

The Book Festival goes from strength to strength, and the programme of authors is first-rate again this year. Events of Jewish interest that have caught my eye are:

- Howard Jacobson, talking about his recent book *The Making of Henry*, at 11.30 am on 17 August
- Jeremy Bowen (appearing with John Keay) on the Six Day War, at 3.00 pm on 20 August
- Saturday 21 August is particularly rich in Jewish interest, with **Eva Hoffman** (12 noon) on *After Such Knowledge*, dealing with the legacy of the Holocaust, **David Cesarani** (3.30 pm) on his biography of Adolf Eichmann, architect of the Final Solution, and **Frédéric Brenner** (6.30 pm), on 25 years of photographically recording the Jewish communities of the Diaspora.
- **Amos Oz** appears three times, talking about his latest book *A Tale of Love and Darkness*, at 11.30 am on 25 August and at 8.00 pm on 26 August. He is also answering questions about *My Michael* for a World Book Club recording at 4.30 pm on 26 August
- **Bernice Rubens** (appearing with Rachel Billington), is talking about her story of two British soldiers held hostage in Israel in1947 at 2.30 pm on 25 August

Two strong strands of the Book Festival this year are 'Exile and Diaspora' and 'East and West'. There is much on the Middle East, Islam and Palestine. Of particular interest is likely to be the Scottish playwright David Greig and the Palestinian author and human rights lawyer Raja Shehadeh talking about Grieg's dramatisation of Shehadeh's *When the Bulbul Stopped Singing*. This memoir of Ramallah under curfew is being staged at the Traverse during the Festival. Joyce Macmillan will be chairing this event at 8.00 pm on 24 August.
