Letters to the Editor

Dear editor and cofaithful,

As well as having my own position on the UCU Boycott (or any such proposed boycott of Israeli academic institutions), I've come to a view on the issue of Liberal Judaism's 'Official Policy' on it, which is that they should not have one!

Whether those currently serving Liberal Judaism's members as executive officers have collectively come to a majority view in favour of the Boycott or against it, they have neither institutional mandate nor moral right to declare that view as an official position or policy. Liberal Judaism is a broad movement, and the very inclusion of the word LIBERAL in its name should provide a clue both as to its capacity to form and express a group stance on any given issue, and as to the desirability that it should do so even if it could. There is a parallel, here, with something Maurice Naftalin pointed out in his letter last month: the UCU Boycott is not, in any case, the fully significant Official Policy that its capital letters here and Liberal Judaism Executive's self-important subsequent Response might indicate it to be. That is because of the practicalities involved. For example, what about the institutional joint ventures and educational exchanges between Israel and the UK? A fully enforced Boycott would disrupt such activities and would actually contravene the constitutions of universities and colleges affiliated to UCU. Similarly, it could be argued that for Liberal Judaism's Executive to insist on officially promoting an official policy for or against the Boycott, would be for it to overstep its own remit in the affairs of its constituents.

Finally, what of my own personal opinion on the Boycott itself? Well, would that it were truly official, enforced and more than a scream inside a dustbin: I would be all for it. Academics in a democracy who fail to use their influence in high places and rally their students in lower places to avoid fascists like Sharon and Olmert gaining power and developing apartheid in their midst? They clearly need a kick up the backside!

Honey Chocolate Cake

Ingredients:

1/2 Cup sifted flour
1/2 teaspoon baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
6 oz semi-sweet Fairtrade chocolate
2 eggs
6 Tablespoons honey
1 Tablespoon vanilla
1 Cup chopped nuts (optional)
1/3 Cup butter

Instructions: Sift together all dry ingredients. Melt chocolate and butter, then cool. Beat in eggs, one at a time. Beat in honey and vanilla. Stir in dry ingredients and nuts. Butter an 8"x8" pan. Bake at 375 for 30 minutes, making sure to test for doneness. Top with whipped cream

Rosh Hashanah

Rosh Hashanah, the Jewish New Year, is a a two day holiday celebrated on the First & Second of Tishrei. Rosh Hashanah is the beginning of the Yamim Noraim, the ten days of atonement.

On Rosh Hashanah, all mankind is judged. HaShem writes the judgment for each of us in the Book of Life. This judgment is based on our lives of the year before, and is the decision of what will happen to us in the coming year.

On Rosh Hashanah it is customary to eat foods that are sweet with flavor. This symbolizes the "sweetness and good fortune" of the New Year ahead. Foods flavored with honey, apples and carrots are commonly served. The Rosh Hashanah meal begins with apple and challah dipped in honey.

Challah, the bread usually eaten on the Sabbath, is also specially prepared for the holiday. Instead of the traditional braided loaf, the Rosh Hashanah challah is round symbolizing the cycle of the new year. The design of ladders or birds are added to the holiday challah by some families to commemorate the prayers rising to Heaven



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
