Human Rights

Universal human rights are integral to Judaism. The belief that every single person is created in the divine image; that the human family is one; and that we are all obliged to deal justly with each other are fundamental Jewish beliefs. Indeed, one of the most esteemed rabbis in Jewish history – Rabbi Hillel - claimed that the entire Torah, the Hebrew Testament, could be summed up into one line 'that which is hateful to you do not do unto others'; a thought that still underlies the Universal Human Rights Movement today.

The Jewish people's struggle throughout their history for freedom from oppression and tyranny gives them the experience to advance universal human rights, as many of the horrors the Jews experienced are still being faced by other communities today. These include:

- The negation of cultural rights.
- The denial of basic rights to education, language and religious practice.
- Racism, discrimination and prejudice
- The expulsion of whole communities and the denial of their rights to property and restitution.
- Verbal and physical abuse.
- Collective punishment.
- Torture.
- Genocide.

The Universal Declaration on Human Rights (see www.un.org/Overview/rights.html)

was formulated in response to these experiences, in particular the tragedy of the Holocaust, in which collectively over six million Jews, Roma, homosexuals, disabled persons and political opponents of Nazism were executed. Consequently, this experience has empowered many Jewish people to lead the advancement of human rights and freedoms for oppressed individuals and communities around the world.

We will be celebrating the International Day of Human Rights on Saturday 6th December - in conjunction with Rene Cassin (see www.renecassin.org/?q=Home), the Jewish

Human Rights organisation - with a themed Shabbat service (am) and discussion group (pm). To contribute to the service, or for information on how to get involved with the issues raised, please contact me.

The New Ten Commandments: Human Rights Film @ Filmhouse

On Sunday, 14th December at 3.15pm a special film event will take place at the Filmhouse on Lothian Road.

To celebrate the 60th anniversary of the Universal Declaration of Human Rights, Lansdowne Productions and the Scottish Documentary Institute gathered together some of the most talented filmmakers and visual artists based in Scotland today. Collectively they created the feature length documentary, The New Ten Commandments.

United by a single theme – Human Rights in Scotland – the film communicates a variety of artistic visions whilst exploring the real life stories of those for whom the Universal Declaration has intimate meaning. With testimony of human rights abuses sitting alongside tales of human rights recognition, the film is both an emotionally powerful journey and an exercise in passionate filmmaking of the highest calibre.

1. What is your favourite Jewish holiday?

My favourite holiday is the festival of Purim. I love the character Esther and she is my favourite Jewish heroine. I also love Purimspiel and Hamantaschen. More seriously, there is so much hope in this festival and it is so good to believe, even for just a moment that all Hamans can be defeated.

2. What is your favourite Jewish food?

I love latkes, chicken soup and gefilte fish. I have some very romantic memories from Paris in which gefilte fish was involved but I will not say anything more about it. And by the way, my mums' chicken soup and latkes are really amazing!

3. What is your favourite Jewish food?

My very first meal in a Jewish community centre was in Paris, many many years ago. It was such a lovely feeling to feel welcomed and really belong somewhere after "a clandestine life" in Poland. Just the freedom of being myself, after all this time, was wonderful! More recently, I loved my conversion trip to London, the Bet Din, the Mikveh, and the a lovely meal in a kosher restaurant with Rabbi Mark, Gillian and Helen. It was a fabulous day! And it was not even raining.

4. What do you like best about ELJC?

Being an ELJC member just makes me feel how nice is to be Jewish within a community and our community is really a fantastic one. I hope it will grow!

5. What is one secret you can share with Our Crowd?

I am a fully qualified French and Italian teacher and I am currently teaching in the French Institute and in Berlitz Languages centre. Languages are my biggest passion. I am just trying to brush up my Russian and I am learning Spanish. I will be delighted to improve my Hebrew and discover some new lessons. Yippee!

Here is another secret. I spent most of my life in Paris, so If any ELJC members ever need some tips when planning a visit to the City of Light, (especially it is for the first time), don't hesitate to contact me.

6. What is your favourite Jewish song?

Some of my most favourite Jewish songs include Belz, Yiddishe mame, Oyfn pripitchik and quite every single song interpreted by Talila who is a very popular Jewish French singer of Polish origin.

7. Who are your favourite Jewish composers, artists, entertainers and authors?

My favourite Jewish composers are Felix Mendelssohn and Jacques Offenbach.

As I mostly love the piano and the violin, I like Arthur Rubinstein, Alexis Weissenberg, Vladimir Ashkenazy, Yehudi Menuhin, Isaac Stern and Yitzhak Perlman, although this is not an exhaustive list. Then there are so many great orchestra directors like Leonard Bernstein, Georg Solti and Zubin Mehta and many others that I also admire. As for lighter music I enjoy Leonard Cohen and Barbra Streisand. I love Woody Allen and many Jewish American actors and directors. There would be too many names to mention as it's extremely rare to be a talented artist in America without being Jewish. Then there are some French actors and humorists I like very much including Elie Semoun, Elie Kakou, Michel Boujenah, Alain Chabat and one of the best French directors, Claude Lelouch. As for the Jewish authors, I enjoy Franz Kafka, Stefan Zweig, Marcel Proust, Romain Gary, Irène Némirovsky and Stephen Fry.

8. If you could have a dinner party with Jewish celebrities, who would you invite?

Woody Allen, Stephen Fry and for more serious conversation I'd be honored to meet Simone Veil, who is a French politician and Auschwitz survivor.

9. What are your favourite travel destinations?

Italy, the south of Portugal, the Lake District and, although this is only a dream for the moment, a big travel around US and Canada.

10. What is your personal journey within Judaism?

Being of Jewish descent, I have always felt Jewish and affirmed myself as such though it was mostly because of historical and cultural reasons. For a long while, the religion was a little bit relegated to the second plan even though I have been lighting my Shabbat candles and fasting for Yom Kippur for many years before coming to Edinburgh. Then, thinking of my future (more serious thoughts like marriage and children's education) I wanted to have it "officially" sorted and decided to convert as I had never received any religious education. When I think of ELJC, I am appreciative of the community for just being there and letting me share all these nice moments and especially for behaving in such a welcoming and heartfelt way since the very first moment I came to see you.
