Thoughts of Chairman Mau

When I spoke about the famine of our days (last newsletter) I didn't expect such an immediate and dramatic illustration of my words, in the form of the Indian Ocean tsunami. This event, so terrible in its human impact, appears at first sight to be truly beyond the control or influence of humanity. Comments on the indifference or even enmity of nature towards humans miss a central point: the earthquake that caused the tsunami was only one tiny shift in the endless movement of the continents over the earth's surface. It is this same majestic movement that renews the earth itself over many millions of years and ensures that it remains fit to support life. Human life – and death – seem insignificant by comparison.

Does that mean there is nothing that we can do except to wait for inevitable disaster, then rush to help? Vital as they are, rescue operations are not the only answer. The tsunami has thrown into high relief many aspects of the global crisis that I discussed last month. Its impact was greatly worsened by many of the ways in which humans have altered the landscape of the region: natural coastal defences of coral reefs and mangrove swamps have been weakened or destroyed by pollution, over-development, or global warming. The worst-hit area, the Aceh region of Indonesia, has been suffering for many years in the grip of a brutal war. Everywhere the infrastructure was badly underdeveloped, making the relief effort doubly difficult.

So in fact this natural disaster had a very strong human component. And so too did its relief: everywhere – in rich and poor countries alike – there was a huge outpouring of sympathy, shaming ungenerous governments into catching up with the generosity of their citizens. (And Jews were not absent from this either: World Jewish Aid in the UK had raised more than £130k at the beginning of January)

But the deep-rooted structural problems of the region, which made this disaster so much worse than it need have been, will only be solved by a determined drive to bring economic justice and sustainable development to the poor regions of the world. At least the Paris Club of "donor nations" has temporarily frozen debt repayment from countries affected. But much more is needed. That is the connection that I see with the campaign to **Make Poverty History** that I wrote about last month. To work for its three aims of "Trade Justice", "More and Better Aid", and "Drop the Debt" would be the best tribute we could pay to the terrible suffering caused by the tsunami.

So – give what you can now (if you haven't already done so) and let's get on with helping the campaign change the world for good in 2005.

A: Northern Exposure

Expedition to the north of Israel. A day with MDA; explore the beauty of the Galilee and Golan Heights; visit borders with Lebanon and Syria; visit UJIA projects and programmes bringing together Israeli Jews and Arabs. On the way back to Jerusalem we will stop at the multicultural Haifa, including its Leo Baeck School campus.

B: Art & Culture

Immerse yourself in he creative and cultural milieu with a team of professional artists. The programme will include participative painting session, guided visits to institutions of artistic interest, a dance workshop and Israeli night culture.

C: Off the beaten track

Includes: Rabbis for Human Rights, visits to a settlement, Palestinian village and tour of security fence; Dawn service on Masada, walk in Ein Gedi national park and an overnight Bedouin experience; JNF day; visit to Mizpeh Ramon crater.

The three groups meet up in Jerusalem for the final two days.

A Word from the Rabbi

"I have always found prayer difficult. So often it seems like a fruitless game of hide-and-seek, where we seek and God hides...Yet I cannot leave prayer alone for long. My need drives me to God. And I have a feeling that God has reasons for hiding, and that finally all my seeking will prove infinitely worthwhile. And I am not sure what I mean by 'finding.' Some days my very seeking seems a kind of finding. And, of course, if finding means the end of seeking, it were better to go on seeking."

I am utterly drawn by these words from the turn of last century; words not of a Jew but of Leslie D Weatherhead, a Christian. They really hit the mark for me and sum up my relationship to the theological games that God and I play when I am in shul (and sometimes outside of it).

However, I am fully aware that this is not the only reason why I or anyone else steps foot in a shul. We are all there for different reasons and, for your own reasons, you chose to become part of the family of Liberal Judaism and to adopt its liturgy.

I do hope that you will join me in using Siddur Lev Chadash (Prayer book of a New Heart), for the second time in your history on Friday 4th and Saturday 5th February.

I would also like to invite you to spend time with Siddur Lev Chadash with me as chaperone on the Saturday afternoon. It is a 'get-to-know-you' in terms of using the liturgy that is as relevant for home use as it is for the shul, for use in study as well as prayer. I will be guided by you in terms of the direction we take, so it really is your opportunity to challenge me until I call 'time' for Havdalah!

I am really looking forward to seeing you all again.
