Chairman's word

This Friday is Tu B'Shvat, so we decided to celebrate with a seder, though I don't think our planning for it went much beyond making sure that there would be enough food available, and that it wouldn't last very long!

For myself, I vaguely knew that it's an occasion for planting trees - in Glasgow this used to be a very enjoyable if muddy variant of Religion School. So I was very pleasantly surprised to find a wealth of material on contemporary meanings that are being found in Tu B'Shvat. The first piece below (from the Coalition on the Environment and Jewish Life, COEJL) explains the origin of Tu B'Shvat in the beginning of the accounting year for the calculation of tithes on fruit trees. Modern understanding reinterprets this unpromising start in terms of the tithes that we, as stewards of the earth, owe to its Owner. COEJL has many ideas for activities around Tu B'Shvat and its Seder that we can use to remind ourselves of our responsibilities as stewards and ways we can begin to fulfil them. For this year, though, I've chosen (in the second piece), only to reproduce a single prayer expressing love and respect for nature as God's creation.

What is Tu B'Shvat?

Tu B'Shvat, the New Year of Trees, falls on the fifteenth day of the month of Shvat. Tu B'Shvat is the beginning of a new cycle for the tithe on fruit trees. Before the destruction of the Temple in Jerusalem in 70 C.E., ten percent of all produce was set aside for the support of the priestly class and the poor. Tu B'Shvat (which means "the 15th of the month of Shvat") marks the beginning of a new fiscal year for tithing. While the Temple is no longer standing, the principles that lie at the foundation of the practice of tithing are eternally relevant. According to Jewish tradition, the earth is the Eternal's and all that it holds (Psalms 24:1). The Land must not be sold beyond reclaim, for the land is Mine (Leviticus 25:23). The land is not ours do to with as we please. We must be responsible stewards of both the land we inhabit and its produce.

According to the biblical tradition, this requires sharing the bounty of the land with those in need, allowing the land to rest during the Sabbatical year (every seventh year), redistributing land every fifty years (the Jubilee), and maintaining the integrity of the land so it will sustain future generations. Though Tu B'Shvat no longer serves its original fiscal function, Jewish communities have continued to celebrate the New Year of Trees as a minor festival. In the 1600s, Kabbalists (Jewish mystics) in Tsfat created a Tu B'Shvat seder modeled after the Passover seder. Participants eat four different categories of fruit and drink four different combinations of red and white wine or grape juice, symbolizing the four seasons and the mystical "four worlds". The early pioneers of the State of Israel celebrated Tu B'Shvat by planting trees. This practice continues today.

In recent years, Jewish communities around the world have begun to celebrate Tu B'Shvat as a "Jewish Earth Day" - organizing seders, tree-plantings, ecological restoration activities, and educational events, all of which provide an opportunity to express a Jewish commitment to protecting the earth.

A Tu B'Shvat Prayer for Creation By Rabbi Warren G. Stone

Source of Creation and Life of the Universe, we gather together on Tu B'Shvat, as Jews of conscience, with a deep spiritual bond to your natural wonders, to affirm and preserve creation.

We are grateful for creation in all its majesty: the ever-flowing waters, the azure blue skies, the complex life of Earth's forests, the myriad of lifeforms--amoebae and falcon, black footed ferret and wild turkey, human being and soaring eagle.

The life of all creatures and our own lives are One, profoundly dependent upon each other. We call our ancient scroll of wisdom, the Torah, an "eytz chaim," a tree of life, for it, like the Earth's great forests, sustains us. Torah teaches us that creation, in its great diversity, is harmoniously interconnected. Like the trees, we too need strong and deep roots for nourishment.

The uplifted branches of trees point to our future. God let us be strong, as strong as ancient trees. The Psalmist was right when he said, "like a tree planted by the waters, we shall not be moved."

We are grateful for the life we are lent. We pledge to lift up our voices both in praise of You and in defense of Your Creation.

REFLECTIONS Jewish Musical Journeys

The **REFLECTIONS** project grew out of the North Western Reform Synagogue's music director Viv Bellos' inspirational idea of creating an anthology of melodies sung in progressive homes around Britain at *Seder*, *Chanukah* and *Shabbat*. There are numerous tunes sung to the same lyrics which reflect the family's origins, and by tracing the source of these melodies and the stories that accompany them, we can create a social history of the progressive movements in Britain.

Working with project manager Vicky Joseph, formerly Reform Judaism Social Action co-coordinator, a substantial amount of money was raised under the auspices of 'Alyth' synagogue. With the benefit of a £50,000 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund as well as several other donations, some anonymous, Viv and Vicky have started to interview people with fascinating songs and family stories. The first interviewee provided us with a marvellous Pesach song '*Echud Mi Yodea*', the verses in Hebrew and the chorus in Arabic, which her grandfather had learned as a small boy, from his father who lived among the Spanish Jews in Jerusalem. Another interviewee, although singing the familiar traditional tunes, learned them whilst growing up in Nairobi.

Our advisory group includes Geraldine Auerbach of the Jewish Music Institute, musicologists Victor Tunkel and Dr Alexander Knapp and head of JFS Music Department Simon Appleman. However – the REFLECTIONS project can only succeed with the input of people like **YOU**. We need your songs, particularly those that are different to the traditional tunes and we need your stories. We'd also like photographs of your family, if you have them. Don't worry if you don't have the voice of an opera singer - it's not important!

As this material is recorded it will be put directly onto our website and at the end of the project it will be published in an archive, copies of which we hope will be housed in Jewish communities and music institutes around the world.

Viv is happy to run a workshop at your synagogue to explain more about the project and also to interview anyone who may be able to contribute to the project at home, anywhere in the UK. The more material we can record, the more exciting the archive and the website will be. Mango & Avocado Salad with Sticky Balsamic Vinegar

Serves 4 Ingredients

Generous handful of pine nuts Olive oil for toasting 2 small Fairtrade avocados (not too ripe) 3 small or medium, ripe Fairtrade mangoes 1 ripe Fairtrade lime Good quality balsamic vinegar

Method

• Mix the pine nuts with a little olive oil and place in the oven on a baking tray to toast for five minutes, or until nicely golden.

• Meanwhile, peel the avocados and mangoes and slice them lengthways into generous pieces. Mix and arrange them on a plate – but avoid damaging the delicate fruit.

• Add a generous squeeze of lime juice, a drizzle of the stickiest balsamic vinegar you can get your hands on, and scatter the toasted pine nuts on the top.
