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Scotland Limmud Day Expanding Horizons

Sunday 10 February 2008

The final programme for the Scotland Limmud is now available. There will be a full day of events running in a number of strands: family programme, textbased/Torah, religion & spirituality, Israel, arts & performance, history, contemporary issues, and panels or tasters. Session descriptions are available at www.limmud.org.

Rabbi Mark will lead a text study session, 'Not Called "Your Son" but "Her Son", on the history of the Jewish status of children and Stephanie Brickman will teach a Yiddish singing workshop of Nigunim. Other highlights include Nancy Morris on 'L'Chaim: Is Drinking on Purim Healthy for Jews' and -- for those who missed her appearance at the Lit -- novelist Tamar Yellin reading from and discussing her awardwinning first novel, *The Genizah at the House of Sepher*.

Creche Up to age 5

Chair's Word/AGM Report

This is my report to the AGM on Sunday. If you've already seen it, skip to the election results.

It's good to be able to report another successful year for our community. All the main indicators of our health remain good: we continue to grow in numbers, and we are sustaining, and sometimes increasing, our activities. The reports that accompany this one paint an encouraging picture.

This is the second year in which Rabbi Mark has been our foster-rabbi, and the level of his involvement with us has, if anything, increased. Our relationship with him has been one of the most successful aspects of the development of our community, for which we should thank Liberal Judaism (LJ), the Liberal Jewish Synagogue, and of course Rabbi Mark himself. His services are always very well attended, but his weekends here also routinely include adult education through the Talmud reading group, teaching a class of proselvtes. and leading the Kabbalat Torah group of postbarmitzvah teenagers. So we don't give him a quiet time! In addition, he has a presence in the wider Jewish community-his talk at the Lit in February was received with acclaim by a packed audience, and he is speaking again at the Glasgow Limmud next month.

We have maintained the same schedule of religious services as last year, with monthly Erev Shabbat and Shabbat services, and services to mark all the festivals. The highlights of the religious year include the bar mitzvah ceremonies of Adam Barclay and Ricky Hogg; our seder, again in Columcille to accommodate the increased numbers; and our very well-attended High Holy Day services.

One satisfying aspect of the year has been a sense that we are extending a little more beyond core religious activities:

- With help from LJ, Lauren organised a Tent event for young adults;
- three proselytes whom we have supported have been to the Rabbinic Board;
- adult Hebrew classes are revived with an enthusiastic new teacher;
- social activity is good, around services (like the seder, the Melrose outing, the chavurah services and the family suppers) and in social and theatre evenings

Since we are paying the new adult Hebrew teacher at a professional rate (and we are considering making similar arrangements for the cheder), it's gratifying to be able to announce that we are anticipating a very large donation from a long-standing member, specifically for education. Not only does this greatly relax our financial constraints in planning educational work, it also represents a big vote of confidence in the future of the community (and this, from someone who actually knows what we're like!)

It's only when I come to write this report that I realise how much we are doing. Although a lot of work is done by a few people—as always in communities like ours—the community couldn't sustain this level of activity without a lot of enthusiastic support from the whole council and from the entire membership (and family and friends!). I shouldn't single individuals out when everyone deserves a mention, but two people I really want to name are Kristi, who has been working very hard in the near-invisible post of newsletter editor, and Rebekah, who is stepping down from council after years of hard work for the community.

And this will be my last year as chair—a wellplanned constitution guarantees that! I must be feeling an anticipatory glow, since I'm not ending with my usual list of complaints. There are still many areas in which we should be doing more, but we should also recognise that we've achieved a lot to be proud of in the last few years.

WINDOWS for PEACE

A Summer School in Edinburgh for young Palestinians from the Occupied Territories (OPT), Palestinian Citizens of Israel and Israel Jews

When Judy Sischy (Edinburgh) and Brenda Beecham (Newcastle) were in Israel in 2007, they visited Windows for Peace in Tel Aviv and were inspired to launch this project for July 2008. You may remember WfP as a recipient of our Kol Nidre appeal three years ago.

WINDOWS caught our imagination because it aims to bring together young people from the Middle East, aged around 12-17, through correspondence, the media and the arts. One of their main achievements is the production of a magazine, which is achieved largely by communication between young people about their personal lives through letters or e-mails, many of which are heart-rending.

Sadly, if the young people are to come together, it still has to be in a neutral venue outside the Middle East. There have been two summer schools to date, both in Italy, and when we visited the WINDOWS offices in Tel Aviv, we began to explore the possibility of a summer school in Edinburgh, a city that is proud of its tradition of diversity. The WINDOWS team was excited at the prospect and on our return we began seriously to investigate the possibility. We were greatly encouraged by Edinburgh City Council to go ahead.

The summer school would create an opportunity for 15 young people to meet and experience intensive interaction through a facilitated dialogue and sharing of values. They will have quality time to look at the Middle East conflict from a different perspective, away from the tensions of the region, supervised by adult interpreters and leaders. The aims of the summer school are to create more trust, openness and sincerity between the participants, to develop a deeper knowledge and understanding of the issues of the Middle East conflict, to share values and vision and to inspire higher motivation to be active back home towards change.

The summer school project needs £30,000 for flights, accommodation and other expenses. We would be delighted if you would consider contributing to this project by sponsoring an individual, which would amount to a donation of £2000, or by making a donation of any amount you choose. We would be immensely grateful for any support that you can give.

We have managed to make arrangements for the group to come to Edinburgh in July 2008 and have already been promised almost £15,000 towards the costs. We dearly hope that we shall raise the remainder to enable the summer school to go ahead. For further details please contact me through Maurice or Gillian.

The emphasis of the Festival is on spirituality, and on spiritual, educational, and artistic and cultural approaches to peace and mutual understanding while celebrating Scotland in international terms. Most of the Festival events are held in Edinburgh. There are five main strands to the 2008 Middle East Festival, namely:

- 1. spirituality, and relations among spiritual and faith traditions;
- 2. education and audience development;
- 3. arts and culture;
- 4. celebrating the diversity of Scotland;

5. celebrating Scotland in international terms.

As part of its many attractions, the Festival contains events of specifically Jewish interest, including a talk by Rabbi Nancy Morris, songs and stories in different Jewish traditions, and a workshop with the Jerusalem Peacemakers.

The Festival is organized by the Edinburgh International Centre for Spirituality and Peace (EICSP), a Scottish Charity, and the Edinburgh Institute for Advanced Learning, EIAL, and with the support of many other organizations.

Liberal Judaism's Biennial Weekend 4-6 April 2008

The Liberal Judaism Biennial Weekend will be here before you know it, at the beginning of April, but we still have places and look forward to welcoming you. As well as an exciting array of workshops on our theme "Creation and Creativity", an exploration of arts and sciences, we are lucky to have some special speakers and participants.

Our after dinner speaker on Friday night will be Alan Ereira, well known as a writer, film maker, director and producer of historical TV and radio programmes. His best known book is co-authored with Terry Jones (of Monty Python fame) — "Mediaeval Lives" presents wonderfully human stories that bring the period to life. In 1991 Alan made an award winning film about the Kogi, a Colombian culture with their own, highly developed story of creation which mirrors that of the Bible. Even at that time, more than 15 years ago, the Kogi were concerned about the impact that humanity was having on our planet; and so we start to see both sides of our weekend's subject.

On Saturday, focusing more on the "creation" side, we are lucky to have Dr Mark Levene with us. Mark is co-founder of History!Rescue, a pressure group of academics who recognise the potentially catastrophic impact that humanity is having on the biosphere through climate change. He is the editor of "Surviving Climate Change: The struggle to avert global catastrophe", as well as being a historian and committed speaker on Israeli-Palestinian relations. On Saturday morning Mark will be participating in a Question Time debate on climate change and the environment.

Throughout the weekend we will have various opportunities to engage with our "musician in residence", Judith Silver. Judith has been sharing songs and facilitating singing with people of all kinds since 1999. She adores learning and teaching songs from all over the world, as well as encouraging the revisiting of known, favourite and forgotten songs. Given her belief that singing together is a gift that all can share and enjoy, her presence will help to keep us all in tune!


