
A mailing will be sent to all members later this month. Papers for the meeting will be included and the venue details confirmed.

Book Now for New Hebrew Class Starting in February

Are you interesting in learning or improving your Hebrew? Would you like to study the language of the prayers in depth? A second series of Hebrew language classes will be starting in February.

Using the siddur as our core text, instructor Yifat Haber will lead us through close study of selected prayers or berachot, providing an opportunity to learn grammar, vocabularly and some of the history of the language. Yifat welcomes requests for specific prayers or berachot to study.

This will be a four-week course, beginning the first week of February, and meeting weekly. Each session will be two hours long, held on a day to be agreed. The venue is also under discussion, but is likely to be in Leith. Sukkat Shalom is pleased to subsidise the cost of tuition for members. Tuition for members will be £4 for the course; for non-members £40.

New students at any level are very welcome! Don't worry if you are a beginner or if your Hebrew is rusty. We can have more than one session if required.

Kabbalat Torah (KT)

Kabbalat Torah ("receiving the Torah") is a ceremony for young people after bar mitz-In Edinburgh the KT group, which vah. meets with Rabbi Mark when he is up, is planning to conduct a service this year, with our own theme and structure. The idea behind KT is that Liberal Judaism believes that thirteen is too young an age to commit to Judaism and stop learning. Also, children are not recognized as adult until much later than thirteen in modern society. The KT service therefore gives the group the personal decision to renew their commitment to their faith at an age when we are more mature.

KT encourages us to delve deeper into Judaism and discover how it affects issues in our lives and the society we live in. Apart from the preparation for the service itself, the program includes participating in the religious and cultural aspects of the community. And recently we even got a trip to Amsterdam...

Daniel and I, alongside KT members of Rabbi Mark's synagogue and our brother Isaac, went on an educational tour of Amsterdam last month, exploring various synagogues and aspects of Jewish life different to ours in the UK: in particular we visited the Anne Frank house, and read extracts from her diary describing the hardships of life in hiding from the Nazis. This had an impact on me, especially. because although I had heard so much about Anne Frank, the diary, and the difficulties of her life in hiding, I didn't really understand the mental strength and fortitude it must have required to stay in the cramped conditions of the secret annex for so long. Reading her diary also gave me insight into the whole concept of suffering. From one person's suffering, many others can derive hope from the fact that whatever oppression we experience, we can always resist and somehow survive, and also an appreciation of our freedom, all the greater for knowing the price that people like us have paid for it in the past.

But as well as this rather melancholy interpretation of her diaries, the visit to Amsterdam also had many positive experiences derived from such things as visiting the museum of Judaism, visiting various Dutch synagogues, having a little insight into the lives of Dutch Jews (we were hosted by members of a Dutch synagogue) and non–Jews (they cycle A LOT!), and being able to share these truly wonderful experiences with a number of liberal Jewish teenagers just like ourselves!



Personal Security Issue - Signing online petitions against anti-Semitic websites

In response to Gordon's well-advised cautionary item on Personal Security on the Internet, I would like to make the following response in order that it may be helpful to others. I do not imply any criticism of either Gordon or the L & B Police – they are acting on our behalf and are being vigilant for our security and safety, for which we thank them.

The original Site which has caused so much upset and controversy is this one –

http://www.JewWatch.com/

On the surface, it seems to be quite innocent and innocuous, but it has obviously been used for more dubious purposes. Following its discovery, many people all over the world – Jews and non-Jews alike – took exception to this site and asked Google to remove it (see my separate page on Google's Response to the problem).

The website called 'Shitler's List' (not to be confused with 'Shitlers List' which is a pop band) then came into being – see the links below. I do urge you to read the Introduction before you go the 8 Volumes in the list. If you are concerned at all that your name may have been added inadvertently, I would suggest that you go to each volume and do a search for your own name (Ctrl +F and put in your name). I did this plus a couple more names and can happily tell you that I do not seem to have appeared on it! I also point you towards this site –

My own personal view on the signing of Internet Petitions is this –

It is very important that we are aware of the inherent dangers in signing all online petitions. I do sign online petitions from time to time, but I choose carefully what I sign and why I am signing it. My name regularly appears on different websites for a variety of reasons - whilst being cautious, I don't think we (or I personally) can 'go underground' when there are grave matters against which to protest. I appreciate that it can also cause problems, but silence is not always an option - being silent will often compound the issue. I'm sure there are many others besides me in both Jewish Communities who do sign petitions and we/they should have the personal freedom to do so.
