Note from the Chairman: Community Development Report

Although we haven't had many public events since the start of the year – and you may think that it has been particularly quiet since the AGM in March – I would like to reassure you that things are not standing still and that we are making good progress towards our goal of a fully-functioning community. The focus for activity is the Steering Group, which is acting as a management committee for the community until we can have proper elections. Meetings of the Steering Group are open to all members of the community, and notes from the meetings are posted on the website (www.ssedin.org). But since not everyone can get to meetings, or to the website, I have given a brief run-down of what we are up to in the enclosed report.

...and a note on the Scroll

Plans for the scroll are progressing well. We have made a deposit to the scribe of £1500 from the £3000 that we have already raised, and we are about to send out fundraising letters which we hope will bring in the balance of £2750 (this sum includes costs for dressing the scroll and for making a portable ark). *A big thank you to all those who have already made pledges, your generosity is much appreciated.* We are planning the siyyum (completion) ceremony, which will introduce the scroll to our community, for Sunday 5th September.

Jewish students from the Former Soviet Union (FSU)

With the help of a London-based charitable trust one or two Jewish students form the FSU have been attending the Edinburgh International Summer School each year. The summer school brings together students from all over the world to study English literature together in an atmosphere of mutual understanding. Some of us have enjoyed meeting the FSU students in past years and found their accounts of some of the difficulties they have very moving.

This year there are three applicants, but only full funding for one of them. The other two are having difficulty raising the remaining funds themselves. They only need a few hundred pounds each, but on their teacher salaries this is not easy. After about half a mile, you need to take a left turn into Grange View - its just after - nearly opposite - the main entrance to the 'Sun' factory which is on the right. Turn left at the roundabout into Grange Knowe, then take the first on the right and we're at the bottom. Tel no is 01506 845325 if you get lost. Its about 15-20 mins walk from the train station - Nick can give directions if needed or we're sure we can arrange to pick people up.

Community Development Report

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We are at work on the following major issues:

- We have agreed a draft of a constitution, which we will send out to members during the next week or so for comment and approval at a meeting in July. We have to get this formality out of the way before we can set ourselves up formally, because it's required for us to have charitable status and a bank account of our own.
- 2. We have been discussing the issue of federation affiliation we want to think seriously over whether we will be more at home in RSGB (as until now) or ULPS (the Union of Liberal and Progressive Synagogues). We have asked the two federations to come and talk to us. The first of these meetings will be at 7.30 on Wednesday June 16th, at St. Columba's Church on Johnston Terrace, when David Jacobs and Rabbi Amanda Goldby will be discussing the question of our affiliation from the RSGB's point of view. Please do make a priority of this meeting, as it's important that the community make this big decision later from a well-informed position. The ULPS will be represented by Rabbi Aaron Goldstein, who we hope will be taking Erev Shabbat and Shabbat service on the 1st and 2nd of July, though this is not confirmed yet. We may have the opportunity for further discussion on our own before we make the final decision at a meeting on 12th September.
- 3. Plans for the scroll are progressing well. We have made a deposit to the scribe of £1500 from the £3000 that we have already raised, and we are about to send out fundraising letters which we hope will bring in the balance of £2750 (this sum includes costs for dressing the scroll and for making a portable ark). We are planning the *siyyum* (completion) ceremony, which will introduce the scroll to our community, for **Sunday 5th September**.
- 4. We are planning services for the High Holy Days this year erev Rosh Hashanah, Rosh Hashanah, Kol Nidre and Yom Kippur. Rabbi Aaron Goldstein, of the ULPS, has kindly agreed to lead our services for a greatly reduced fee. We are hoping to organise a choir to improve somewhat on our usual musical performance (as if that were possible...)
- 5. We have been in discussion with various local authorities and cemetery companies about burial arrangements. Although we have not fully explored all the possibilities, we are hopeful that Corstorphine cemetery will prove to be right for our requirements. In a survey of community needs that we hope to conduct soon, we will be asking what arrangements you want to have made for funerals, though we understand that it's a subject that many people won't have thought about too much.

6. We have been discussing the options for the cheder. The current tentative proposals have us splitting the cheder into two classes, and meeting fortnightly as against the (theoretical) monthly meeting we have had until now. This will require a lot of planning and preparation, so the new programme will start in the autumn, around the High Holy Days.

If you can get to the web site (<u>www.ssedin.org</u>) there is more detail on all this work, and on yet other subjects (welfare, adult education, and communication) on which we haven't really got started yet. (You will need a password from me to get to the community-confidential information). If you can't get to the web site please talk to me or to any member of the steering committee: Rebekah Gronowski, Jonathan Brodie, Gordon Barclay, Liz Goring, Ricky Hogg, Gillian Raab, Josh Brickman, Ida Skubiejska, Rachel Savage, Stewart Green, Nick Silk, Colette Lamb, Lindsay Levy, Stephanie Noblett.

As you can see, a great deal of work is going on and everyone involved is very positive about our progress. There is a lot of positive energy in the community at the moment, and we are all looking forward to September, which will see

- the introduction of the scroll to our community
- the General Meeting which will set our community on a firm formal footing
- our first High Holy Day services

Although these are only the first steps towards the goal we have undertaken of building an independent progressive Jewish community, we can say with confidence that we have set out well.
