### **Modern Customs**

In modern Judaism. Shavuot was chosen as the day to have confirmation services for boys and girls, replacing the traditional Bar Mitzvah. which occurred on the first Sabbath after a boy's thirteenth birthday. Bar Mitzvah means `Son of the Commandment' and is the time when a young person takes on the responsibility for keeping the Law or Torah. In Israel today the first fruits aspect of Shavuot has been revived. Children wearing hair bands of flowers, and carrying baskets of fruit and flowers, make a procession to the synagogue. There is much singing and dancing, and tambourines, recorders and other instruments may be played in the procession. Homes and synagogues are decked with greenery and flowers as a reminder of spring. There is a legend that Mount Sinai itself was green and covered with flowers, even roses, when God gave the Law to Moses.

It is traditional to eat dairy foods on Shavuot. There are a number of legends concerning this. The Torah is compared to milk, because it contains everything needed for nourishment, just as milk is a complete food for a baby. Milk is the food of the spring, after the young animals have been born. A more exotic legend is the thought that the Israelites had been fasting while Moses met with God. After Moses came down the mountain with the Law, the Israelites were so hungry that they could not wait to kill and prepare meat, so instead made a meal of dairy food. Whatever the reason. dairy foods such as cheese blintzes and cheese cake are strongly associated with this festival.



#### Letters

Dear Sir, I note from the May 2006 edition of our newsletter that there is a column advertising a Palestinian Film Festival at the Edinburgh Filmhouse. While I appreciate that the advert has been taken from the Filmhouse programme presumably without solicitation from the Edinburgh Filmhouse, I find it strange that this subject matter has merited half a page of promotion in the newsletter.

I appreciate that it may be liberal policy to take a fairly "catholic" view of the world around us and that I have not seen the content of any of the offerings, surely it is not the function of Sukkat Shalom to promote political culture where the State of Israel may not be fairly represented. There is plenty coverage of middle east affairs in the national press and news and people are able to form their own views from these media. Better still they should get on a plane and go and see for themselves. The Jewish peoples' long term future is invested in a miniscule part of the middle east. with negligible natural resources, and sometimes it is not possible to view the rights and wrongs of this investment in a totally impartial manner. In any event, there are plenty of alternative organisations where Jews of all persuasions can pursue their own particular road map.

#### **Fairtrade Tiramisu**

#### Ingredients

2 eggs, separated\*
10 sugared sponge biscuits
75g/3 oz icing sugar
300g/12 oz mascarpone cheese
125ml/5 fl oz double strength Fairtrade ground coffee

75g/3 oz Fairtrade chocolate Aerosol can of whipped crea

#### Method

Place the mascarpone cheese, two yolks and a little sugar in a mixing bowl and beat until well mixed.

Whip egg whites until stiff, then add the rest of the sugar. Fold into the cream mixture. Pour some double strength filter coffee into a bowl, and dissolve a couple of teaspoons of icing sugar into it.

Dunk five of the sponge fingers into the coffee, soaking thoroughly before placing them in a serving bowl or basin. Make sure they don't get too soggy.

Grate half the chocolate over the mixture.

Create the second layer by repeating steps 4 6

Finally, decorate with cream.

\* If you are concerned about the use of raw eggs in this recipe, Michael Barry has suggested that as an alternative you could use 100 ml/4 fl oz of Greek yogurt. However, he added - with a hint of regret in his voice - that it wouldn't taste quite the same.
