'The Festival affirms the diversity contained within the religious and spiritual traditions of the Middle East, as well as these here in Scotland, in justice and equality. The Festival takes no fixed position on any political, ethical or cultural question. We intend rather to create a forum in which we can listen to one another more deeply and learn with a more open mind and heart. The emphasis of the Festival is on spirituality, and on spiritual, cultural, and educational approaches to peace and understanding.'

Welfare Committee News

I am pleased to tell you that the community now has a functioning Welfare Committee consisting of Colette Lamb, Lisa Barcan, Maureen MacKinnon, Philippa Levinson, Ricky Hogg, Stewart Green (Convenor) and Sue Lieberman.

The group has now formally met twice and has started putting some ideas into place around meeting the welfare needs in our community. We thought that in the short term at least, we would focus on identifying the most important needs to respond to. As a result, we have come up with the following three key areas:

a) Provision of a 'welfare support line' telephone contact number for members to call in the case of illness or other welfare/personal need. A need for additional help can affect anyone at any time, but those who live alone and have no immediate support locally are likely to be particularly vulnerable. It is hoped that the support line will provide a reliable, flexible and rapid way for members to contact the welfare group if/when the need arises.

b) Arrangement of lifts/transport to community services and events for those whose age or health make it difficult to get there under their own steam

c) Development of increased telephone and visiting contact for those in our community who would benefit from some additional social interaction.

The current position on each of these areas is as follows: Firstly, I am very pleased to announce that Ricky has kindly agreed to be the main first point of contact for the new welfare support line. We are currently in the process of acquiring a dedicated telephone number which we will be able to divert through to Ricky or to another member of the team when Ricky is not available. We will publicise the number as soon as it is available. In the meantime, a big thank-you to Ricky for kindly offering to front this.

I myself have taken on the role of co-ordinating lifts for those whose age or health means they have difficulty accessing events without assistance. If you fall into this category or indeed, if you are a car driver and would be willing to provide an occasional lift to a community event please contact me and let me know. In terms of the contact side, we would particularly like to hear from anyone who would be willing to give a small amount of time to give an occasional, but regular, phone call or visit to one of our more isolated or vulnerable members. If you would like to discuss this further please contact any of the welfare group.

Getting all of this off the ground seems more than enough for the immediate future. In the longer term however, we are planning to conduct an informal but more extensive, survey of member needs. In the meantime however, please do contact us if you have any particular comments, queries or ideas or indeed, if you would like to contribute in some way to the work of the team (all offers of help will be gratefully received!). Wimpels - a cheder project

Gillian Raab writes:

When Rachel asked me to do a project on Wimpels for the cheder I wondered if she had gone meshuggah. What had nuns' headgear to do with Judaism? I checked the internet for 'wimple' and it confirmed my view. But I had the spelling wrong. I should have tried 'wimpel'.

A wimpel is the name for the binder that is used to hold the torah scroll together. In nineteenth century Europe there was a tradition that a mother would make a wimple, decorated with embroidery or painting and including the child's hebrew name, from the swaddling cloth used to hold a baby boy at his bris. This would then be used at the boy's bar mitzvah. Wimpels were also made in honour of weddings and kept by families to bring to the synagogue on special occasions.

This tradition has been revived in the US recently, not only for boys and it is not just the mother who makes them. Our children made their own at a recent cheder, painted on strips of linen, and every one did an excellent job with their Hebrew names own special interests illustrated.

Rabbi Aaron writes Dazed & Confused

Purim is such a bizarre chag (festival). My mind is constantly reeling at Purim. It reeled as a child when I was overwhelmed by the excitement of dressing-up, the potential of winning prizes next to my usual stage-fright (unjustified because no one ever trusted me with remembering lines!). It reeled as a late teenager when it was the one festival when alcohol was allowed - even encouraged - in abundance. It reeled as a more serious young adult realising for the first time the full import of the final chapters of the Megillah which were always conveniently missed out in our sanitized shul retellings: blood-thirsty revenge as we are told that thousands are slaughtered. Still sort of a young adult, I find my self reeling once more, this time at my new found knowledge that according to the Rabbis, Purim will be the only festival along with Shabbat to survive.

This festival which only scraped into the Canon, was given authenticity by the Rabbis who suggested that all the chagim will be cancelled in the messianic future, except for Purim, of which Scripture explicitly states, "These Purim days will not pass away from among the Jews, and their memory will not cease amid their descendents (Esth 9:28)."

I can just about handle this idea, as the Rabbinic idea of the messianic era is one I put down to fantasy rather than fully subscribing to it. But imagine my surprise to find that Purim has, according to the Gerer Rebbe, mystically become the third festival of revelation. On Shavuot the original written Torah was revealed; because its lights were too great for mortals to bear, the tablets had to be broken. Yom Kippur is the day of the second tablets, the Torah as restored by human participation in the revelatory event; it is thus the source of the oral Torah. So far I can understand where the Rebbe was going but...Purim hints at a third level, the revelation of a Torah beyond rules and statutes, Torah as the Tree of Life itself. This Torah is purely mystical, it is the name of God. That which was before the beginning and will finally be revealed only at the end.

My intoxication was in danger of getting on top of me but wait, what is that about a third way for Torah, one of no rules or statutes. This I can understand. The Megillah to me is the ultimate in dysfunction. It is also the ultimate of real life. An amoral world. A ruling power who rules by expediency. Two examples of peoples that would like to obliterate the other. The use of sexual eroticism, gluttony and drunkardness as tools for moving forward a selfish cause.

Purim and Yom Kippur are aligned in name but also in date. Thank God for Yom Kippur that brings us home and into the safety of ourselves. But then, thank God for the realities of Purim, mad perhaps but definitely real, no need for 'reeling' this year. I can see bits of me in the characters and I can certainly see our world in the Megillah story. However, that reality is not without hope. For part of Purim is about realities and realisation. When we are that aware of what our world looks like it that much easier to want to change it and seek ways to do that. Perhaps this Purim may be a new awakening that may even lead to a crescendo on July 2 in Edinburgh.

AGM Report

Our AGM on 30th January was well-attended almost half the community turned out! - and cheerful, as we reviewed a very successful launch year and looked forward a year of consolidating our achievements as a stable independent community. Whereas a year ago we didn't know if we could even survive independently, the achievements of the year have shown the solid foundations of the community in the trust and mutual confidence we have in one another. New challenges arise from our new position: representation on communal and inter-communal bodies, issues of security, and issues of communication within the community. But the foundations are good.

We regretfully accepted some resignations: Rachel Savage as cheder co-ordinator, and Ricky Hogg as secretary, though he will remain on the council. Liz Goring, Phil Wadler, Colette Lamb, and Rebekah Gronowsky have left the council. We thanked everyone for their work and welcomed Harry Riffkin on to the council.

In recognition of the new level of services that the community is providing, the AGM agreed to increase the membership fee to £200 (unwaged £10). Hardship problems will be handled in strict confidence. Also, we made some amendments to the constitution and we decided to investigate the issue of associate status.
