First Sukkat Shalom Bar Mitzvah

On Saturday 11th February the first ever Liberal bar mitzvah in Scotland took place, and it was our very own Joe Naftalin who made history by reading from the Torah at the Columcille Centre. The service was conducted by Rabbi Pete Tobias and attended by some 120 friends, family and community members. The bar mitzvah's grandfather Lionel Naftalin (91) made a moving speech while presenting a tallis, welcoming his grandson into a "civilised religion". Scottish klezmer ensemble "Celtica" Shmeltica" entertained guests. Speaking about the experience, Joe Naftalin, said "Being the first liberal bar mitzvah in Scotland feels like quite an honour. I feel like I'm making history and that makes me want to be a good jew. more than ever." Rabbi Tobias, who was Rabbi to the group during his time at Glasgow New Synagogue, said "It was wonderful to be at the first bar mitzvah ceremony of a fully fledged community, which ten years ago was just an idea." A second Bar Mitzvah follows in April -David Silk is already hard at work preparing!

The brief for the development of the logo was drawn up by committee consisting of Stephanie Brickman, Phil Wadler and Rebekah Gronowski. They summed up the core values of the community as being progressive, inclusive and welcoming as well as having religious dignity and an element of festivity. Latte came up with several options for design which were then taken to council. the chosen design was worked into the logo we see today, of a celebratory figure dancing with a tallis thrown above him, reminiscent of a chupa or a shelter. To provide maximum flexibilty Latte also created a typographic version with just the name of the community, which has a simple dignified look. It's impossible to please all the people all of the time when it comes to things like logos, so it took guite a while to arrive at the final version we have now. Latte showed great patience and professionalism and a deep understanding of Jewish issues throughout the whole process and we as a community would like to thank him. Dear LJ member

The Friends of Progressive Judaism in Israel and Europe FPJ

Its time that I brought you up to date with the Friends of Progressive Judaism, now known as **FPJ.**

The FPJ have been affiliated to the Reform Movement for some years now, and we feel that a balanced relationship requires us to be formally affiliated to Liberal Judaism as well, rather than continue the *de facto* affiliation that has existed for a very long time.

Affiliation gives us more "clout" in pursuing our twin objectives of education and fund raising, which of course can only effectively take place within the two movements. And I am sure you would agree that strengthening Progressive Judaism in Israel, continental Europe and the former Soviet Union should not only have the approval of Liberal and Reform Judaism in the UK but also be of benefit to and enhance the reputation of the two movements here (albeit indirectly).

We are planning this summer to re-launch the FPJ, modernising our image and becoming more "up-beat" in the hope of being able to raise much larger sums of money.

Last September we held another of our "Evenings with" hosted by Harrow and Wembley Synagogue. The theme was "Our twin in Kyiv" and we had an enjoyable and informative talk given by Rabbi Frank Dabba Smith.

Our next "Evening", planned to take place at the LBC-CJE on March 23rd, has the theme

"A FUTURE AND A HOPE - THE TASKS OF DEVELOPING PROGRESSIVE JUDAISM IN EUROPE".

Paul Zatz, Member of the Executive of the European Region of the World Union for Progressive Judaism will speak. Another "Evening" is planned for September to be hosted by Birmingham Progressive Synagogue.

A new initiative was taken last year; we held a Chanukah appeal for the Leo Baeck Education Center-Haifa for the "Lunch and Learn" which raised over £2.000.

Our AGM is to take place at the LJS on 15th June, when Rabbi David Wilfond from Israel will be our keynote speaker.

Following the sad loss of Rabbi John Rayner last year, we are delighted to announce that Rabbi Dame Julia Neuberger has honoured us by agreeing to become a patron.

The British Friends of the Leo Baeck Education Center-Haifa

I am sure many of you will have heard about our independent subsidiary group, the **BFLBEC-H** that was formed last summer. This new organisation is being launched on April 2nd. Its purpose is to help raise the considerable sums LBEC needs for its vital work. LBEC will be producing the necessary publicity material and initiating the required marketing.

British Friends will operate under the "umbrella" of FPJ. Officers of FPJ are and will remain members of its independent committee. All monies raised will be channelled through FPJ who will be responsible for authorising and controlling expenditure and transmitting funds direct to LBEC.

Initially, Harriet Karsh is chairing the committee.

Family Activities

A list of activities that will make your Purim a one to remember.

The mitzvah of sanctifying the festival (KEDUSHAH):

The custom of setting a festive table and holding special meals during the day as well as at night. (PURIM SE'UDAH - Purim feast).

The custom of eating HAMANTASHEN

The mitzvah of hearing the readings of the Megillah and reciting the proper blessings (3).

The mitzvah of saying the SHEHECHIYANU blessing (1 of the 3).

The mitzvah of reciting BIRKAT HAMAZON with the additional blessing AL HANISSIM (on the saving miracles of Purim).

Attend services on Shabbat ZACHOR (the Shabbat of Remembrance), one week prior to Purim, Remember the evil ones who sought to destroy the Jewish people. Contribute or work to stop anti-Semitism and in particular, neo-Nazism.

The custom of fasting on the day preceding Purim (TASANIT ESTHER - the Fast of Esther) to share in the heroic, but anguished, deed that Esther did for her people.

The mitzvah of honoring the divine in human relationships:

Tell and discuss the story of Purim, sing songs, etc., as a family or with friends.

Send portions of food (2 minimum) to friends and relatives (SHALACH MONES or MISHLO'ACH MANOT). Give something to at least one friend. Bring the gifts in person and express to your friends how much their friendship has meant to you.

Give TSEDAKAH to the needy (MATTANOT L'EVYONIM - gifts to the poor).

Donate three half-dollars to the synagogue to commemorate the donation of the three half-shekels to the Temple.

Act on the meaning of Shabbat ZACHOR and Purim by aiding Syrian Jews/Jewry in Arab lands/the Falashas.

Think of any place in the world where genocide is taking place, be it against a Jew or non-Jew, and do something to stop it. Write or protest or send money to strengthen that struggle against genocide.

The mitzvah of study:

Study and discuss the Book of Esther prior to or during the festival.

Compose a Purim Torah (a satire on Rabbinic learning). Use humor to learn and to teach about Judaism.

The mitzvah of rejoicing:

Tell jokes and cheer people up.

Sing Purim songs.

Blot out the name of Haman during the reading of the Megillah with a GRAGGAR (noisemaker) and by shouting, stamping feet, etc.

Really let yourself go -- live it up and rejoice -- at your Purim feast. According to the Talmud, one should drink alcoholic beverages until one can no longer distinguish (AD LO YADAH) between the names of Mordecai and Haman.

Dress yourself and your children in costumes for the Megillah reading.

Send SHALACH MONES to friends and family via children in costumes.

Put on a PURIM SCHPIEL (a satiric Purim play), elect a Purim rabbi, hold a Purim carnival.

Set up a group of Purim players, travel from home to home and entertain people with brief skits or invite some groups to your home for such skits. (You may choose to raise money through these performances for a good cause.)

Recipe for Hamentaschen

Ingredients

2/3 cup butter or margarine

1/2 cup sugar

1 egg

1/4 cup orange juice (the smooth kind, not the pulpy)

1 cup white flour

1 cup wheat flour (DO NOT substitute white flour! The wheat flour is necessary to achieve the right texture!)

2 tsp. baking powder

Various preserves, fruit butters and/or pie fillings.

Method

Blend butter and sugar thoroughly. Add the egg and blend thoroughly. Add OJ and blend thoroughly. Add flour, 1/2 cup at a time, alternating white and wheat, blending thoroughly between each. Add the baking powder with the last half cup of flour. Refrigerate batter overnight or at least a few hours. Roll as thin as you can without getting holes in the batter (roll it between two sheets of wax paper lightly dusted with flour for best results). Cut out 3 or 4 inch circles. Put a dollop of filling in the middle of each circle. Fold up the sides to make a triangle, overlapping the sides as much as possible so only a little filling shows through the middle. Squeeze the corners firmly, so they don't come undone while baking. Bake at 350 degrees for about 15-20 minutes, until golden brown but before the filling boils over! Traditional fillings are poppy seed and prune. Apple butter, pineapple preserves, and cherry pie filling all work quite well.

The number of cookies this recipe makes depends on the size of your cutting tool and the thickness you roll. Use a 4-1/4 inch cutting tool and roll to a medium thickness, and get 20-24 cookies out of this recipe.

Choir of London concert

As part of its tour to Jerusalem and the West Bank in 2004, the Choir of London performed the world premiere of the specially-conceived "Jerusalem version" of Sir John Taverner's Lament for Jerusalem". This stunning work is based on a combination of Christian, Islamic and Jewish texts which ties in very closely with the choir's inter-cultural aims. This performance marks the release of the choir's performance of the Lament on CD, alongside the world premiere of a major new work for choir and orchestra by the leading young composer Tarik O'Regan, with whom the Choir already has a close relationship.

In conjunction with the British Council, East Jerusalem, the Choir of London is inaugurating a bursary scheme to enable talented young Palestinian musicians to participate in summer music programmes in the UK, and this concert is one of two (the other being in London) to mark the launch of this scheme.
