This has been a matter of great concern to many people and the Women's Interfaith Group has met with the Chaplain of the University (Rev Di Williams) to discuss what could be done. We feel that there should be at least something put in place of the Bibles for students who find themselves in a time of crisis or loneliness.

Apparently, the Students' Union has said that they do not wish any other books to be put in the place of the Bibles. What they have agreed to (in principle) is the placement of an A4-sized card with relevant phone numbers & Helplines etc.

In our discussions, we felt that there should be at least one text from each of our Faiths represented within the University which could give comfort in such times of crisis. Obviously these cannot be long texts but should be apposite and succinct.

<u>Launch of the</u> British Friends of the Leo Baeck Education Centre Haifa

Lady de Rothschild, Michael Howard MP and Israeli ambassador Zvi Heifetz were among speakers at the launch on 2nd April of the British Friends of the Leo Baeck Education Centre – Haifa.

The centre seeks to break down barriers, to advance social justice, and give learning opportunities to children, almost from birth, without discriminating as to race, religion, disabilities or means. Carol Brauner, the Centre's UK development director, told the audience at The Liberal Jewish Synagogue that the Leo Baeck High School had grown to more than 900 pupils. In addition to their usual academic studies, pupils even have the chance to take part in the Duke of Edinburgh Awards. The Centre recently received the Israel Prize for Education.

Leo Baeck Junior High School, with more than 750 pupils, has used the latest solutions for tackling violence in schools and enables children to reach the highest levels of academic achievement. There are some 100 children in the well equipped pre-school and kindergarten. The Centre also embraces the Lo key International Academy of Jewish Studies, which through its teacher training, workshops, study groups and international educational programmers encourages a positive Jewish commitment among non-orthodox Jews in Israel and the Diaspora.

Under the umbrella of the Leo Baeck Community Center, Arab and Jewish children at risk have an after-school Care and Learning section: the Kirby Spinal Clubhouse provides a haven for such children. As well as a sports center for the fit, there is a place for the elderly to meet, Beit-El Street. At the heart of the education Centre are two synagogues: the Ohel Avraham Synagogue, founded in 1978, and the new Hugo Gryn Outdoor Synagogue and Gardens.

At the launch, Harriet Karsh, who chairs the British Friends, suggested several ways in which supporters could contribute to the newly

formed organisation. Of course, pennies (or shekels, as the case may be) are important, and Liberal and Reform congregations as well as individual congregants are urged to be generous, perhaps including BFLBC-H in their High Holy Day appeals and/or various fundraising activities, including donations in honour of birthdays or in memory of a loved one. But there were other ways to get involved: through committee work and administration and by spreading the word to friends and colleagues.

This year's Hugo Gryn Conference in Haifa will be held on Sunday 28 May. The theme is 'Excellence or Equality in Progressive Judaism?'. The British Ambassador, Simon McDonald, will welcome delegates prior to an opening address by Rabbi Mark Winer. Details from <u>carol@leobaeck.org.il</u>

Gary Rhodes' Fairtrade Banana Fritters with Bitter Chocolate Sauce

Serves 4

Ingredients

Banana Fritters

300 ml (10floz) sweet cider 100g (4oz) plain flour plus a little extra for coating 25g (1oz) caster sugar 4 Fairtrade bananas, peeled Vegetable oil for deep frying

Chocolate Sauce

300g (10 oz) Fairtrade Dark Chocolate, chopped 150g (5 oz) unsalted butter 75 ml (3 floz) double cream

Instructions

To make the fritter batter, mix the cider, flour and sugar together. Cut each of the bananas horizontally into 4 lengths and lightly flour each piece. Dip them in the batter and deep fry in hot oil for about 5 minutes until golden and crispy. Drain well.

To make the chocolate sauce, place all the ingredients in a bowl over simmering water until the chocolate has completely melted. This sauce must be served warm.

To serve, place the fritters on a plate and pour the chocolate sauce next to them. Alternatively serve the chocolate sauce separately and decorate the fritters with a sprig of mint.

Harvey's centre of excellence

ONE of the many things on my 'To Do' list is to learn more about my ancestors as well as the history of the Jewish community in Scotland. The obvious place to start is the Scottish Jewish Archive Centre. I decided to make a start on my research so I went along to the centre to visit director Harvey Kaplan.

In the early 1980s there was an exhibition run by the Gorbals Fair Society. The Jewish community was contacted to participate and Harvey Kaplan volunteered to help prepare something. It prompted the question of why there was nothing permanent in the community. The **Glasgow Jewish Representative Council agreed** to adopt the project. A committee consisting of Harvey, Kenneth Collins, Jack Miller, Leslie and Sydney Naftalin and others was formed and requests were made for material. Garnethill Synagogue's offer to make a room available was greatly welcomed. Being the oldest synagogue and communal building in Scotland it seemed the ideal location. In 1987 the Scottish Jewish Archive Centre was formally opened there. They now have two rooms - an office/store and a display room - containing a wide range of material.

The Centre collects items relating to all Jewish communities in Scotland - both past and present. That includes Ayr, Dunfermline, Falkirk, Greenock and Inverness which all had functioning communities in the past with synagogues and a minister to lead services - albeit sometimes in unusual places. Services in Ayr were held at the Invercloy Hotel.

Amongst items held are documents, books, synagogue artefacts, ceremonial keys, trophies and assorted objets d'art. Harvey said: "We are interested in the complete Jewish experience in Scotland including businesses and the whole range of organisations - religious, welfare, youth, cultural, charitable, sporting and educational." Everything has been catalogued on PC and a database holds records on more than 28,000 Jews who have lived in Scotland.

The main sources of information have been shul registers, records from all Jewish cemeteries in Scotland, from Inverness to Greenock and census records. The Centre is constantly busy and in demand. Harvey said: "Material comes in all the time. Hardly a week goes by without me receiving something from members of the community, visitors to Open Days and Jewish visitors to the city.

"I'm getting more and more enquiries from people doing research from all over the world. There were 40 enquiries in the first quarter of this year from school pupils doing projects, students writing dissertations and others. There has also been a lot of media interest including the recent Andrea McLean TV footage and an article for The Big Issue this month on the Jews in Scotland." The Archive Centre tries to work with different organisations in the community - helping them with displays for anniversaries or projects or publications. It is mutually advantageous as more material is gained for the Centre.

As the community shrinks Harvey gets called in when buildings close down so that the interiors and exteriors can be photographed and material saved for posterity. Although a large collection has already been gathered, Harvey pointed out that as much material and information as possible is wanted. He said: "We want people to give more information and documentation originals or copies. Everyone has a story about their family - when, how and why they came here. We are relying on these stories being handed down."

It's clear that the Archive Centre has a lot to offer and that there is a great deal more information still to be ingathered. I'm certainly looking forward to a return visit to do some research and hope to be able to take some material on my antecedents with me.

There is a booklet available from the Centre - Glasgow Jewish Journeys, which costs £2 or £2.50 if posted.
