### **Letter from my Travels in Manchester & Beyond!**

In July this year, I was privileged to attend the Bar Mitzvah of Dr. Gabriel Astill (Gabi) at the Manchester Reform Synagogue, Jackson's Row, where I received a very warm welcome. The Service took place on Shabbat 'Pinchas' and was a wonderful occasion, one that I shall remember for a long time. Many of you will know that Gabi is a professional violinist and a Doctor of Musicology – it was wonderful to hear him chanting, not only the Berachot, but the Parshah and Haftarah; this is a very difficult task and which he carried out brilliantly! It was a joy for me to listen to the beautiful singing of the twelve-strong choir, singing *A Capella* in four parts. – truly uplifting experience. At the end of the Service, Rabbi Silverman invited Gabi and Denise Isaacs up on to the Bimah, where it was announced that they are to be married, their Chuppah is to be next May and I look forward to being there for that occasion also! We all went downstairs for a wonderful Kiddush and great celebration!

#### We all wish them 'Mazeltov' and may they have many happy years together!

While I was in the area, this was also a 'journey of nostalgia' for me – my family roots are in Manchester and in the surrounding districts. My great-grandfather was General Manager of Mandelberg's in Manchester & my father was born there but moved to Timperley in Cheshire. So, the preceding Friday evening, I took myself off to the Menorah Reform Synagogue in Cheadle where I received a very warm welcome from Rabbi Brian Fox and his congregation. Rabbi Fox hails from Australia and the Service reflected his verve and enthusiasm with very lively singing from all present. We reached a point in the Service where none of us knew the tune to that particular Psalm – so he said, 'OK, so you don't know it – we'll learn it!' - and learn it we did in only a few minutes. This, again, was a memorable occasion for me, long to be remembered.

On the Saturday afternoon I went to meet my last-surviving cousin on my father's side whom I had never met – but she remembers pushing me in my pram when she was fourteen – 60 years ago! This was such a joyous occasion – we had so much to catch up on and she filled in the 'gaps' in the family history. She had been brought up by my Jewish grandmother – she even looked like her! She took one look at me and said' You and I could be sisters' – and she was right, we looked so alike – we even had the same mannerisms. It's amazing how many family features and characteristics are inherited and not copied! I think we must have talked non-stop for about four hours in the comfort and luxury of the one and only Midland Hotel – a real taste of the past!

After four days exploring Manchester and its environs, I travelled South down visit to my family. While I was there I went to the Milton Keynes and District Reform Synagogue which is my 'local' Synagogue when at home. This community started much as we have done, but twenty six years ago! Last August they completed the building of their brand new, purpose-designed Synagogue and yes – it has full disabled access and facilities and is all on ground level. It was the first time I had seen the building and again, was made most welcome. They also had a choir, which, on that day, consisted of about eight members – this is variable according to who is around and it was in the middle of the holiday season.

I came home feeling that I had made many new friends as well as visiting old friends and seeing my family for much longer than usual - altogether a very enjoyable holiday! I look forward to my next visit, which will be after the birth of my first great-grandchild!

Dear Members of Sukkat Shalom,

As you will know from Ricky and from the recent publicity, East Lothian Council is hosting an event called 'Our Days of Light' in the Brunton Hall, Musselburgh on 9th October 2003. All the Primary Schools throughout East Lothian have been carrying out a project on the major Religions represented in East Lothian; the statistics are based upon the latest Census figures for Religious affiliation. The figure for the Jewish population in East Lothian is 6% of the total of 92,000 of the population, which is 5520 people. These are ones who have declared a Religious affiliation to Judaism – this makes very interesting reading as it adds up to a potential increase in the numbers for our Community. Quite obviously, not all of those who declared are Reform, nor are they necessarily practising Jews but – food for thought!

Talking of food – during the evening it is hoped to be able to provide various traditional dishes from each of the Faith communities represented. For this I would really appreciate your help, please. Can any of you please volunteer to cook a few latkes, gefilte fish balls, falafel etc. etc.? If so, please keep any receipts you have for the cost of ingredients as there is a fund set aside to reimburse anyone who contributes items of food. Please let me know if you can help in this way – collection of food can be arranged on the day. Please let me know as soon as possible as we have to make other arrangements for four of us to cook 3,000 latkes etc. if there are no offers – it can be done if necessary!

Say a short Prayer for Peace during the Service


Cook some traditional Jewish delicacies

#### Glazed Honey And Sesame Chicken Strips

6oz chicken breast 1 tbsp of honey 1oz sesame seeds. 4oz plain flour

Take the chicken breast and cut it into one-inch long strips. Dip the pieces into the honey. Add the sesame seeds to the flour and season with a pinch of salt as well. Once the chicken is covered in the honey, drop it into the flour and cover well. Heat up your deep fat fryer and drop in the chicken pieces until they are cooked. Remove and drain on a sheet of kitchen paper and these are ready to serve, either as a starter or as a kids meal. You can spice them up a bit by serving them with a little chilli or soya sauce.
