The Hagim – service details

As you all know, this year we are holding the 'full range' of High Holy Day services in Edinburgh. As this is a first for us, it seems appropriate to list a few points which will help the services to run smoothly. Sorry if this sounds a bit regimented, but it's the best way of letting you know!

The times of the services are shown below. All services will be held at St Columba's, with the exception of the Simchat Torah service which will be at the Quaker Meeting House. Note also that our Sukkot service is being held on Friday 1st October and not the first night of Sukkot, which is the preceding Wednesday.

Prayer Books

The RSGB machzor will be used for the Erev Rosh Hashanah & Rosh Hashanah services. Some photocopies will be available for those who do not have their own.

A draft version of the RSGB machzor, in booklet format, will be used for the Kol Nidrei and Yom Kippur morning services. There are plenty of these booklets.

We have still to confirm whether we will be using RSGB or Liberal Judaism prayer books for the remainder of the Yom Kippur services (except for the children's service which will have a special book). As such, if you have an RSGB machzor please bring it along on Yom Kippur!

The Sukkot and Simchat Torah services will use RSGB Pilgrim Festivals prayer books.

Children

We do not plan to have an official crèche during any of the services. However, we will have some 'worksheets' relating to the High Holy Days which children will be able to complete/colour in.

For those parents wishing to take children out of the services and use the worksheets, the area outside of the hall at the bottom of the stairs at St Columba's is suitable. However, there will be no supervision provided and as such parents who wish to take children out of the service will have to provide their own supervision, since children must be supervised at all times.

Obviously children are welcome to attend any of the services, but we would ask that parents ensure that the dignity of the services is maintained. There is a service specifically for children at 4.30pm on Yom Kippur, to which children (and all adults) are invited.

Sukkot, Fri 1 Oct: 6pm (4pm)

Building and decoration of the sukkah will begin at 4pm. Please lend a hand and bring along greenery from your garden, plus fruit from your garden/allotment/bought from shop etc. The service will start at 6pm – and then we will have to take the greenery away again and be out of St Columba's by 8pm!

Simchat Torah, Wed 6 Oct: 7pm

We hope to have flags for Simchat Torah. However, in case we don't get any, it is suggested that children (of all ages) make their own and bring them along. If you can make some to share out, so much the better. Sweeties are also welcome!

My mum's delicious Lekach

A particularly moist honey cake whose flavour is enhanced with ginger preserve as well as the usual powdered spice. The cake rises at least 1 inch/2.5cm in the oven so to prevent the mixture bubbling over the sides it is important to use the specified size of tin. As it does not need maturing for more than a day you can make it at any time up to the eve of the festival, storing it well wrapped in foil. It can be easily mixed by hand or with a food processor.

9oz (250g/2 1/4 cups) self-raising **flour** OR 9 oz (250g/2 1/4cups) plain flour plus 2 teaspoons baking powder

2 teaspoons each ground ginger & cinnamon

1/2lb (225g/3/4 cup) clear honey

4oz (125ml/1/2 cup) sunflower oil

3 oz (75g/1/2 cup) **soft dark brown sugar**

1 **egg**

4 oz (125g/1/2 cup) ginger preserve

6 fl oz (175ml/3/4 cup) **hot water** mixed with 1/4 level teaspoon **bicarbonate of soda**

Preheat oven to gas mark 2.

Grease a 2lb (1kg) loaf tin measuring approx $9 \times 5 \times 3$ inches (about 22 x 12 x 7cm) and line the bottom and the two ends with one long strip of silicone paper.

Sift together the flour and spices into a bowl Put the honey into another bowl, then add the oil, sugar, egg, preserve and half the flour mixture.

Stir until smooth, then add the remaining flour mixture and the hot water mixed with the bicarbonate of soda, stirring until the batter is thoroughly blended – it will be very thin.

Pour carefully into the tin. Bake for 1 1/2–1 3/4 hours or until the top is springy to gentle touch and a skewer comes out clean from the centre. Place on a cooling tray and leave until cool.

To serve, cut it into slices 1/2 inch/1cm thick and then into fingers. Eat and enjoy!

Chutzpah Alert: Jewish Culture Gets Hip

Lately, Jewish culture is being put on the map with features in recent editions of *Time* and *Time Out New York*. Both magazines spotlight clothing that proclaims Jewish pride, or as one company seasonally puts it: "Chanukah Chutzpah".

Web sites, including **rabbisdaughters.com** and **jewcy.com**, are targeting Jewish youth with pride T-shirts bearing mottos like "Jewcy" – a play on the popular designer brand, Juicy – which celebrates "kosher-style fabulosity".

Rabbi's Daughters sells T-shirts that say "Oy Vey" which means woe is me, and "Shiksa" which refers to a non-Jewish female. The Rabbi's Daughter line is now in more than 100 stores and non-Jewish people are buying too.

Then there is *The Hebrew Hammer*, a new film modeled on the "Blaxspoitation" films of the '70s like *Shaft*. It features an orthodox "stud" who is a "sexy and powerful Jewish action hero". It's all for laughs.

But why all the attention now?

Julia Lowstein, who put a Jewish spin on J. Lo with her company **Jewlo.com**, says it is a way for Jews to show off their identities.

"Younger Jews are accepting their Jewish identity and looking for ways to represent it," she told *Time* magazine. "With the alarming rise in anti-Semitism on college campuses, as well as in the national consciousness, young Jews are feeling that now is an especially important time to be forthright and proud of who they are".

Even fashionistas and non-Jewish celebrities are getting into the act. Christina Aguilera and Kelly Osbourne have been spotted with Jewish pride T-shirts.
