Tickets and Security

For reasons of security, admittance to all services will be by ticket only. All members will receive a ticket by post prior to the High Holyday services. All visitors, including friends and relatives, who wish to attend services are requested to apply to the Secretary for a ticket. We ask for a donation of £25 for tickets, but it is our policy that no-one will be prevented from attending services on the grounds of cost. We request less from anyone under 30, and we don't request anything at all from full-time students.

Mitzvot

All members will receive a 'mitzvah invitation'. If you do not receive one, or if you would like to discuss any aspects of the mitzvot, please speak to Nick Silk.

Children

We do not plan to have a crèche during any of the services. However, we will have some 'worksheets' relating to the High Holydays which children will be able to complete/colour in. For those parents wishing to take children out of the services and use the worksheets, there will be a separate room at St Marks. However, there will be no supervision provided, so parents who do wish to take children out of the service will have to provide their own supervision, since children must be supervised at all times. Obviously children are welcome to attend any of the services, but we would ask that parents ensure that the dignity of the services is maintained.

There is a service specifically for children at 4.30pm on Yom Kippur, to which children (and all adults) are invited.

Memorial Service

If you have a relative whose name you would like to be remembered in the memorial service on Yom Kippur, please let Nick Silk have details (Hebrew name, English name and relationship). It would be helpful if these details were given prior to Yom Kippur.

Prayer Books

This new exhibition multimedia includes: Specially commissioned photographs by lan Lillicrapp, Rena Pearl and Arnhel de Serra illustrating the little recognised diversity of Jewish people in Britain.

An original film, created for the exhibition, exploring what it means to be Jewish and British in today's multicultural society. This includes interviews with former MP **Oona King**, author **Rachel Lichtenstein**, a Jewish tailor of Moroccan origin, **Ben Helfgott MBE** a Holocaust survivor who represented Britain in the Olympic Games and young women from the Indian Jewish community.

Photographs from Living Faith, a project by the Wolverhampton Interfaith Group exploring the role of faith in modern society. Winning photographs from the Museum's public competition exploring minority identities in Britain today.

The Last Goodbye

The Rescue of Children from Nazi Europe
Running until 10 September 2006

The Last Goodbye is an exhibition by the Jewish Museum, Finchley, which tells the remarkable story of 10,000 unaccompanied children rescued from Nazi Europe on the Kindertransport.

The Last Goodbye records this extraordinary story through evocative photographs, documents and personal testimonies. The exhibition casts a vivid light on the experiences of these young refugees, the heart-rending decision of their parents to send them away, and their difficulties in adjusting to life in a foreign country. Tracing the rise of Nazism, the exhibition highlights core issues relating to prejudice, racism, conformity and indifference. It also demonstrates the courage and kindness

of those individuals who opened their homes to these refugee children. The exhibition is accompanied by a number of films and discussions around the issues of Jewish refugees from Nazism.

Life is Red

Running until 10 September 2006

Hackney Music Development Trust presents an exhibition of miniatures, sculptures and textiles created by students from Prague, London and Nürnberg, representing their responses to the Holocaust. The exhibition is linked to the world premiere of HEAR OUR VOICE, an international music education project, using the arts to increase awareness and understanding of the demonstrated dangers of prejudice and Holocaust.

The Friends of Progressive Judaism in Israel, Europe & the FSU

I'm pleased to be able to tell you about the successful outcome of a call for help from our friends at the Leo Baeck Education Center – Haifa who had closed its doors because it was just too dangerous for students to attend. Indeed most of the staff were unable to go to the site. Many of them were working from home in order to just keep the centre operating.

But lets not forget that the Leo Baeck Education Center runs many other projects and initiatives to further the cause of harmonious relationships between Jews and Arabs.

The Beit Yitzhak centre where the under 6 year olds are given a daily hot meal and looked after, The Mercaz Ruth centre catering for the older kids who are at risk. All of the centres also run co-existence programmes and have many Arab students attending. These centres need so much money to keep them running and your donations were and are absolutely vital.

So far the BFLBEC-H in conjunction with *FPJ* have sent over £17,000. Thank you all for your wonderful generosity. This amazing establishment couldn't run with out your help.

Mocha Ginger Biscotti

Makes about 10 biscotti

Biscotti are very hard Italian biscuits which are lovely dipped into coffee for breakfast or a midmorning snack.

100g plain flour
30g Fairtrade cocoa powder
½ teaspoon baking powder
Pinch of salt
120g unrefined (golden) Fairtrade sugar
½ tablespoon Fairtrade ground coffee
30g dark Fairtrade chocolate, roughly broken up

2 eggs, beaten2 balls of stem ginger, finely chopped

Heat oven to 180°C/350°F/gas mark 4. Sieve flour, cocoa, baking powder and salt into the bowl of a food processor. Add sugar, coffee and chocolate. Process until finely ground. Slowly pour in the beaten eggs and continue to process until mixture binds together into a firm dough. Carefully add milk by the teaspoonful if dough is too dry. Fold in the stem ginger. On a floured surface, roll dough into a log and place on a baking sheet lined with baking parchment. Bake for 30 minutes. Remove from oven and turn down to 150°C/300°F/gas mark 2. Allow log to cool, then, using a serrated knife, cut into 1cm wide slices. Lie slices flat on baking sheet and return to oven for 15 minutes or until firm. Allow to cool completely on a wire rack.

Letters

I read with interest Rabbi Mark's Parashah Pinchas and Maurice's D'var Torah for Mattot-Massey. Both sensitive and thoughtful pieces, from different standpoints. I think those who feel deeply about the values of peace must be encouraged to preach peace, forbearance and understanding not only to Jews and Israel, but also to Hizbollah and its supporters, Iran, Syria, other Arab states.

I'd love to see Maurice given space in an Arab paper- not to apologise for Israel, but to point out to Muslims the error of their ways of war, and their targeting of Israeli and Lebanese and other civilians and how much better Middle East life could be when Israel's existence and positive role and beneficial model for the Middle East is accepted by Arab countries (as it certainly has been by some) and even by the Hizbollah and allied terrorist organizations who are more destructive to the whole Middle East than Israel has ever been.

Media coverage here has been very propagandizing and misleading. Hizbollah do site missiles in civilian Christian housing estates, hospitals, schools etc. with complete disregard of human life (they have an ideology that allows and applauds human sacrifice) precisely so they can then claim to be outraged when the missiles are targeted, the blame is theirs and Maurice should direct his outrage to the correct quarter -Hizbollahs party in Lebanon, or their TV channel. If he contacts Israel's embassy public affairs body he might like to hear some real facts re situation, and examples of the truth more favourable to Israel than propaganda he seems to rely on for info. his compassion does him credit, his information does not. Rabbi Mark reminds us correctly in my view of our duty, and of the right way to approach the situation.
